

V.A.T. It is sad that the B.C.F. Executive Committee, at its meeting on Nov 18th, were advised that Value Added Tax would apply in the case of the B.C.F. income and expenditure because the total would exceed £5,000. I frankly know little of these matters and the Executive, faced with this 10% tax, have decided that registration fees must go up when the tax comes into force next April 1st. The Tax on the present registration fee of 25p would increase the fee to a fraction of a penny between 27 and 28p and it would similarly affect Board Fees, now standing at 5p. The Executive have thus decided the best answer is to increase the Registration Fee to 30p. As this was higher than necessary but keeps a convenient round figure, it was decided to hand the extra back by making the 5p board fee inclusive of V.A.T. without any increase.

COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIPS OF B.C.F.

Following the W.E.C.U. application to the B.C.F. that they should be allotted two places in the B.C.F. Counties Championship Section of this Tournament, the B.C.F. Home Chess Committee considered this matter at their last meeting with your Editor in attendance to put the W.E.C.U. case. I am pleased to report that the B.C.F. Home Chess Committee approved this from the beginning of the 1973/4 season and I feel I must express thanks from the whole of W.E.C.U. for the fairest of possible hearings. Subsequently, on Nov 18th, the B.C.F. Executive Committee then approved the Home Chess Committee findings by approving their Minutes. We now take our place equally beside the other Unions and thus, Gentlemen of the West, it is up to us to do all we can to support and further the cause of the B.C.F. equally with the other Unions on all levels.

Bath is holding celebrations from May to September, 1973, to celebrate the 1,000 anniversery of the crowning of the first King-of-All-England, King Edgar, in the year 973 in that City.

The Teams in the final include the U.S.S.R., Yugoslavia, Hungary, Poland, Rumania, West Germany, England and the winner of the Spanish/Swiss match - thus virtually all the leading players of Europe will be gathered in the West at Bath for one of the most important Chess events ever held there. It is most fitting, therefore, that the Chairman of the B.C.F., Mr D.W. Andertain, should chair the committee for 'Chesa' arrangements and I confidently hope he will be supported by prominent 'West' chess personalities plus local personalities who will supply the local knowledge.

Holland, knocked out of the competition by England last Summer,

is the most likely Country to be asked to supply a Director.

November by 8½ to 11½. The British Champion, Brian Eley, M.F. Stean and A.J.
Mestel all attained 75% scores for the two round event, whilst Hartston, Markland and Mrs Hartston achieved 50% results.

WHY ARE SOME PLAYERS NOT IN THE GRADING LIST??

Following a number of people expressing surprise, or disappointment that 'so and so' was not in the Grading List, I have endeavoured to investigate the position.

Firstly, the B.C.F. Grading regulations require that each player must have returned to the Graders 30 results, preferrably all in that year but not less than 10 with the other 20 in the year before.

Union Graders are permitted to somewhat lower these standards for players graded Under 185 for the purposes of making the Union List more representative of the players and I understand most Graders at Union level will pass something between 15 and 20 results in the last season for a Union Grade, hence the necessity in the Union List of an asterisk or other mark to show when a player meets the higher B.C.F. Standard of 30 games graded.

Next it must be remembered that all seriously played games count for grading, including Club Championships, League Matches, County Matches and Congress games. However Handicap Chess, Lightning Chess, Five Minute Chess and

all casual games do not count.

Thus it should be the aim of each player wishing for a grading to ensure that some 20 games for grading are notified to your County Grader. This is not easy to achieve when your Club Championship is a 'Knockout' type even if one is lucky enough to get 6 or 7 League Matches plus 2 or 3 County games. However if your Club Championship is based on the American 'All play All' type and played out even when one has lost all chance of winning the Championship, such play will give one a start of 10 or 12 games or more if it is a largish club - small clubs could possibly play a double round to build up the number whilst very big clubs could split strong and weaker players into a Major and Minor Championship.

Then the CRUNCH. Each Club should appoint, or ensure some keen official of the Club DOES SEND THESE RESULTS TO THE COUNTY GRADER, preferrably at the end of March with a second short list covering play to the end of April, which is the end of the Grading Year. How many clubs have an officer whose

duty it definitely is to see the serious CLUB games are reported?

I strongly suggest that each Club sees to it they appoint such an officer who will undertake to report the results of Club games - time is short because he must be fully operative by the end of March, or you may well miss out again in next year's list. He has to do NO actual grading, just report the Club Match results, being sure names and initials are right with a clear indication of win, draw or lost for each player, with opponent's name and initials.

Turning to figures kindly supplied me by Mr K.C. Cleak, Hon. Secretary of the Bristol and District Chess League, probably the biggest Chess Organisation in the Union Area, one sees remarkable differences in the ratio of the figures

for Grading and Registration. He quotes:-

Grading-wise this shows Cornwall with the poorest ratio, or the highest Registration Ratio whichever way one sees it. I have checked out Cornwall's grading returns with Mr Kingdon and learn that the Cornwall Grader submitted to the Union Grader some 49 names. Thirtysix of those names met B.C.F. Grading requirements and a further 11 were brought up to an acceptable W.E.C.U. standard after adding Congress games results. Two names with only 4 and 6 results against their names were rejected as ungradeable.

This suggests that some Cornish Clubs do not send in their 'All Play All' results, or possibly players do not play off their games when there is no chance of winning the title, with, possibly, (I do not know the position accurately)

some League officials not returning League results to the County Grader.

The County Grader grades the Club and League results, then sends them on to the Union Grader who adds County Match results and the Congress results he receives from the All England Congress Grader, Mr H.G. Felce. Congress Directors should send all Congress results to Mr Felce, not to County or Union Graders. The results then go to the BCF for final adjustment and approval.

Conclusion on Grading - MAKE SURE YOUR OFFICIALS SEND IN THE RESULTS AT THE END OF MARCH WITH FINAL FIGURES AT THE END OF APRIL. Send in results March and April helps the Grader to get his work done on time.

Considering the figures on the previous page, only Gloucestershire and Hampshire have more Graded than Registered players with there being a big difference in the former county.

It will be further observed that the two counties with the poorest ratio Registration-wise do have really good Leagues with more players taking part in Chess generally. The Bristol and District Chess League, probably the largest and most efficient of all the Leagues in the Union area, quite obviously satisfies the playing needs of its local members, or they would soon revolt and seek greener pastures.

This, unfortunately, leaves the County Associations short and results in reduced training facilities for juniors in general and also causes horrible decisions to be made like failing to enter a West of England

county's side in the English Minor Counties Championship.

One can understand Cornwall and Wiltshire not wishing to loose their Championship matches, but I do believe Devonshire, Gloucestershire, Hampshire and probably Somerset are quite capable of fielding a second 16 or 20 aside teams to fight out who should go forward in the Minor Counties competition from the WEST. Such must give many more players a chance of playing for their counties and step up Registrations as a side-line.

I know Mr K.C. Cleak has circularised all Bristol and District Chess League Clubs on this matter and his 'Lead' might well be followed by

Southampton and Portsmouth Leagues.

The Hampshire League demands full Registration and the Bournemouth League rules require all 1st Division players, who play in more than 2 matches per season, to be Registered. Since this rule was introduced, the Bournemouth 1st Division play has advanced markedly both in quality and quantity - possibly this is not co-incidence and play in standards demanding Registration bringing out that little something in players to add to their will to win.

It means individually 50p a year - chicken-feed these days - and it surprises me that clubs do not just add 50p a year to their subs and

register members automatically - easily the least painful way.

Leagues in South Somerset, Cornwall, Devon and Dorset have that difficulty of travelling distance, not easy on Winter nights, but I listen hopefully to hear of the first club to lead the way by including automatic registration as a part of membership for adults.

CONGRESS RESULTS: -

PAIGNTON This Congress was won by A.P. Law of Lewisham and D. Wright of Kenton, both with $5\frac{1}{2}$ points. P.S. Milner-Barry, President of the B.C.F., was in the lead until he lost his last round to A.P. Law to finish 3rd with 5.

BARNSTAPLE

This Congress resulted in another tie, N.J. Argyris and R. Bellin both scoring 5, or 100% score. L.J. Foster of Torquay, S. Weeramantry of Southampton University, M.E. Binks, Downend and Fishponds were among those to score 4½ points. On 4 points were G.H. Bennett, Bournemouth, J.R. Boyce of Bristol and R. Heaseman of Exeter University in company with well-known players like L.W. Barden and M.J. Basman. Excellently directed by P.H. Clarke with quite, unseen efficiency, prompt draws and an up-to-date scoreboard never far behind play. The Hotel did well when it is born in mind that their main diningroom was used for play and the use of auxiliary rooms for meals.

SOUTHAMPTON

This Open Congress, held at Southampton University, was won by D. Rumens of Surrey and D. Wright of Kenton, this pair agreeing a draw in their last round match with scores of $5\frac{1}{2}$ points. There 108 entries and sharing third place were the Hampshire Joint-Champion, M.W.J. Thompson and the Hampshire President, P.L. Marshall with others, including David Parr. A.C. Barton, Totton, won a share in the Under-170 Grade prize and H.G. Thomas a share in the Under-155 prize. Late applicants to play, of which there were a number, were firmly rejected. The unusual rule of 'Finish all moves in ten minutes after the time check'worked quite well.

A most unusual game between one of the winners, D. Rumens, and S. W.E.C.U. CONGRESS MATTERS

During the 1972 Congress, a questionaire was given to each Championship section contestant. A sub-committee, consisting of the Union Congress Secretary, The Union Treasurer, the Union Match Captain and the Union immediate Past-President, met to consider the replies on Nov 12th last.

The Questionaire answers showed a small majority in favour of 'No Change' in the present rules, although some questionaires were not returned by the players. Whilst a number of Hampshire players must find the rules surprisingly and markedly different from the S.C.C.U. rules to which they have been used, this must clearly indicate the rules work generally well.

After three hours discussion, the sub-committee decided it was better to leave matters substantially unchanged for 1973 when the impact of Hampshire

will be known.

The idea of any other competition than a Swiss was rejected. It was decided that the 1st round play should be 'seeded' and that the last round on Easter Monday should be timed for at least 5 hours play. All competitors this year will be asked if they would be prepared to stay a further day (to

Easter Tuesday) in future years.

This year's W.E.C.U. Congress will be held at Newquay, Cornwall, starting after a Civic Tea reception at 5.15 PM and prize-giving will be at approximately 3.30 PM Easter Monday. Mr M. CHESS CALENDER

Representatives of the four Unions met in London on Nov 18th to consider how well Union activities could be co-ordinated to build an All-England Chess Calender, embodying B.C.F., Union and County activities, together with provision for well-known Congresses.

Under the Chairmanship of Mr J. Rushton, your Editor was agreeably surprised at the very considerable progress made with a hope that the B.C.F. and all Unions, including S.C.C.U. with its very heavy match programme,

and their counties could accept.

For W.E.C.U. it is correct to add that the periods of Paignton and the Hexagon were safeguarded generally, but the W.E.C.U. Congress at Easter unavoidably clashes with the S.C.C.U. Championships at Southend, the large prize Congress at Hammersmith and the pleasant one at Folkestone. I believe all will appreciate such is unavoidable.

I am hopeful that next year might see the start of such a Calender if the B.C.F. Development Committee and Union Executives can deal with it in time.

BATTLE OF BRITAIN TOURNAMENT

This next tournament is the Silver Jubilee of this Chess Competition which has, as its main object, the raising of funds for the R.A.F. Benevolent Fund. Whilst I know Hants players do take part, I wonder if the Bristol Area does, or could form their own section. Full particulars from Mr J. Kennedy, 70 Meadway, Bromley, Kent. Entry fee 50p (Juniors 25p) A worthy cause indeed.

SPAASKY-FISCHER BOOKS

Having had the pleasure of receiving and reading both Gligoric's and Clarke's versions of this Match of the Century, the former gives a true Grandmaster account with detailed knowledgeable accuracy whilst the latter presents a more English outlook view. The great value of these two books at only 50p each is that one compliments the other, giving the English reader a truly English understanding when both books are read jointly together, game by game. A unique opportunity at little cost by modern standards.

OBITUARY

It is with deep regret that we hear of the death of Miss M. Lander of Gillingham. Well-known for many years, she often competed in the British Ladies Championship and took in the Blind Olympaid at Weymouth some years ago.

DARTMOUTH CONGRESS

This Congress was played between 1st and 3rd December at the Raleigh Hotel, Dartmouth with the kind permission of the Hotel owner, Mr H. Baguley. This year's winner was H.C. Thomas with 5/6 score, winning on a tie-break from J.L. Foster - this player scoring 4½/5 at the Hexagon's Woolacombe Congress. The 3rd prize went to Seton Ash of Totness. Alan Gooper of Torquay Grammar School won the grading prize and a second grading prize for those below 115 went to E.
