

ABSTRACTS.... from decisions of the November meeting of the BCF Executive Committee: a BCF Library to be established at the General Secretary's office; from 1977 the British Ladies' Champion to be entitled to a place in the British Championship; £25 prize for the highest-placed BCQC qualifier in the British Championship, £15 prize for the highest-placed BCQC qualifier who competed in the County stage; travel grants doubled for the final stages of the Counties and Minor Counties Championships; a BCF team will compete in the Haifa Olympiad (October 1976) provided that the political situation does not deteriorate.

GRADING..... the following is taken by permission from the Minutes of Federations Grading Committee, recently endorsed by the Executive Committee -

"Tournaments with 'sudden death' finishes can be graded provided that:-

- (i) at least 10 min. are allowed to each player after a 48 move session, or at least 15 min. are allowed to each player after a 40 move session,
- (ii) the controller has discretion to declare a game drawn when he considers and that neither player could win with a normal time limit".

#### B.C.F. REGISTRATIONS, LEVIES, BOARD FEES AND OTHER ATTENDANT HORRORS!!

A tremendous battle was won - not on the chess board - but at BCF Executive level giving the Western Union the absolute right to handle its own registration and levy matters and Mr. Wade has done a tremendous job in his new post as Union Registration Officer. All Counties voted unanimously to get this tricky bit of legislation through as it gives the Union the right to protect its own Counties and their members. When the announcement was made all Counties were delighted.

Alas! Unfortunately it would appear that either Union County delegates do not report back to their Counties or else the Westward Ho! edition of September 1975 has never been read. Some counties are still sending money direct to the BCF.

In addition some Counties are sending board fees direct to the BCF instead of either to me or the Union Treasurer, Mr. Grant.

Will all County Secretaries please note that ALL REGISTRATION matters including finance should be sent to Mr. A.J.L. Wade, "Linton", Kingsgate Close, Erunel Park, Torquay and all board fees to either me or the Union Treasurer.

It is also pointed out that County Adjudications should be sent direct to Mr. G.D. Self or Kintail, 115 Tumulus Road, Saltdean, Brighton BN28HG. Match Captains are particularly requested to comply with this as I have just received two adjudications from a December 7th. match which has been to Norwich and Camborne and now despatched to Brighton.

The Editor would appreciate it if Match Captains put players gradings on result sheets before forwarding them to the West of England Match Captain.

BRISTOL: Mr. Cyril Welch, life member of the BCF and Hon. Life President of WECH has retired as chess columnist of the 'Western Daily Press', the Bristol and West Country morning newspaper.

Mr. Welch, now 74, has been writing his column for 20 years. He learned to play the game as a boy in the First World War and from then on it became a life time passion. He was a leading West Country player for many years, winning the Bristol & Clifton championship a record eleven times and two years ago was still graded over 170 and a formidable player in Bristol chess. He was a founder member of the West of England Chess Association and organised their first championship virtually single-handed, in later years winning it himself.

His opinions and analyses have always been, and still are, much respected by players at the highest level in the game.

He is the first to acknowledge the help and devotion he has had from his wife, Doris, in the 47 years of their married life. She has checked his writings for typing errors in all his years as a columnist, and recalls, with nostalgia, the earlier years of their chess life together when wives would accompany husbands to congresses and tournaments, there to enjoy the pleasures of the resorts whilst the menfolk sweated it out in the wee sma' hoors, maintaining, all the time that they were doing it for pleasure!

Mr. Welch is, by no means, giving up all his varied interests in the game and, among others, will be continuing as Grading Officer for Bristol and District and adjudicator for local junior chess.

#### WEST OF ENGLAND GRADED JAMBOREE. 4th. October 1975.

The North Devon team Match Captain, Mr. G. Kidd, went to a good deal of time and trouble (not to mention expense in telephone calls, etc.) in order to produce the best possible team for this important contest. It was disappointing, to put it mildly, when at the start of play no less than four of his team had not turned up. Eventually two arrived late and were able to play, the other two defaulting. By these two defaults, not only did they lose two valuable points, but the match captain had to pay their board fees and contributions to the tea out of his own pocket, and also that of their opponents as they, angry at having travelled many miles for no play, refused to pay. For the first of these graded Jamborees two years ago North Devon came first without a loss on any of the boards, this year the team came last, scoring only  $3\frac{1}{2}$  points,

#### VBC IS A STIMULATING VARIANT.

Many variants of the game of chess have been invented, the majority soon fading into oblivion, although a few have survived, notably Kriegspiel. Perhaps it is significant that in Kriegspiel the normal rules of chess apply except that each player is certain only of the position of his own pieces and has to discover his opponent's moves and position of pieces by suitable questions and answers through a third party.

Another variation that may catch on if only as a stimulating diversion for special occasions is Varied Baseline Chess (VBC). In this variant each player is free to arrange the pieces on his base-line as he likes, but without knowing how his opponent is disposing of his own pieces. Apart from minor modifications concerning castling, all other rules remain unchanged.

The chief advantage of VBC is that it puts a premium on inventive skill and original thinking, and virtually nullifies the value of memorised bookwork on openings that have been explored in depth. It therefore favours inate ability at the expense of acquired technique, and the results may well cast a new light on the relative ranking of players.

The chief disadvantage is that VBC introduces an element of luck. A player may have chosen an arrangement for his pieces which turns out to be particularly suitable or unsuitable for meeting his adversary's set-up.

In the belief that quite a number of players will wish to explore the possibilities of VBC, a first tournament will be held at the Royal Pavilion, Brighton on Sunday, February 29, from 11 a.m. to 8-30 p.m. An analysis of the best games will subsequently be published as part of a book on the subject by Harry Golombek.

Details of this event can be had from Michael Bizony, Sedgwick Park, Horsham, Sussex. "Chess for Young Beginners" (W. McLeod & R. Mongredian Collins £1.50)

How often have you tried to teach the youngsters to play chess and failed? Well now let the children loose on this book and sit back to let it do the work for you successfully. The book depends on its excellent illustrations by J.P. Colbus (in colour throughout) to hold the attention of the reader whilst showing the basic moves and then progressing to elementary strategy. Each chapter is concluded with practice.examples for the reader to solve. The book is clear, concise and a pleasure to sit and thumb through and should hold the interest of any young reader. An excellent first buy for any youngster to start on the game of chess.

I have recently completed my first game by telephone, which I hope to be cheaper than postage if one can discipline oneself to refrain from wasting words. I am black against an enthusiastic schoolboy, C. Rice of Andover, and the game is notable for its sharp tactical play between moves 10 and 20 and the moral that it is not so much how much material you have but where it happens to be that matters

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The Social Chess Society of Bristol has faded away. Born on March 5th. 1862, it consisted then of a membership of not more than 24 as mentioned in the copper plate handwriting of the original minute book. There never was a club room as such, the boards and men being transported in a wicker basket each month to the home of the member who was acting host for the evening. The buffet supper provided and the conversation were no doubt as great an attraction as the chess! The host would choose an opening which was de regueuer thus enlarging members repertoire for every game at the next meeting of openings, even if only two or three moves! The second world war interupted these affable gatherings of professional people but they were revived in 1946 by Mr. E.M. Shipman of Redland a member since 1933 and met weekly at his home. For a short time they had a team in the second division of the Bristol League but number faltered and it became onerous to field a team... friendly matches... numbers faltered again... old age and sleeplessness after chess guided us to close down completely. R.I.P.

When it comes to correspondence chess the Dragons (a team drawn from the members of Downend and Fishponds Chess Club) are up with the best in the country.

Following two successive wins and a third in the Bristol Postal Chess Championship, they have now registered another outstanding performance by coming third in Division 1 of the Postal Chess League. The winners were B.C.C.S. with 29 points, second London Central YMCA 27 points, with Dragons scoring  $26\frac{1}{2}$  to take third place.

Each player in a team plays four games, a win counting as one point and a draw as half a point. The Dragons in board order scored as follows: R. Martin  $3\frac{1}{2}$ , D.C. Jarrett 2, P.K. Truseler  $\frac{1}{2}$ , Dr. P. Berks  $2\frac{1}{2}$ , D.E. March (Captain) 4, R. Evans  $3\frac{1}{2}$ , I.R. Pickup  $2\frac{1}{2}$ , P. Jones 2, A.Williams 4, R.H. Rowe 2.

With one exception all had scores of fifty per cent or over and two scored maximum points.

The New Year opens with a plea from C.L.A. Schaefer, secretary of the Bristol and District Chess League.

In spite of the increased fee of 30p. per lost adjudication, the number of games submitted for adjudication is greater than ever before. At present Mr. Schaefer holds over forty score sheets with no less than seventy-two adjudications outstanding.

Last season 301 adjudications were processed and this figure will be exceeded this season. A large proportion of games sent for adjudication are a waste of time and money as they do not affect the match results. They also cause unnecessary work for the Secretary, the Adjudications Secretary and the Adjudicators, all of them volunteers.

There is little doubt that the spate of adjudications is due to the grading system which is based on the results of games played. The over enthusiastic player is hopeful that the adjudicator will discover a win for him in a position which could reasonably have been agreed a draw and thus improve his grading by using another's brains.

The matter of unnecessary adjudications merits the further consideration of the Management Committee of the League before hard-pressed officers resign with none ready to take their place.

I think all leagues are suffering from this complaint. Has anyone got the answer?

#### 50-1 GAMBLE BY CHESS MASTER.

British and international chess master Tony Miles paid a flying visit to Plymouth yesterday to take on 50 young players-all at once. The matches were held at Plymouth College, where Mr. Miles moved rapidly from one opponent to the next, taking four or five seconds over each move.

The young players, members of Plymouth Schools Chess League, were left with three or four minutes to ponder their chances of defeating the champion before he returned, with a quick reply to their moves.

Mr. Miles, 21, who is studying at Sheffield University, is one of Britain's small handful of chess masters and is expected soon to gain the title of Grand Master.

He came to Plymouth at the invitation of Mr. Ken Bloodworth, president of the Plymouth Chess Club, who has known him for several years.

All the players were sponsored, and the money raised will help pay for the junior chess international Glorney and Faber Cups, to be contested in Plymouth next July.

BEATEN BY TWO. Two 17-year-old boys managed to win and five others drew, leaving Mr. Miles with 43 victories from his 1,800 moves in just over four hours.

The boys who won were Stephen Williams, a Devon County player from Sutton High School, and Martin Sommer who plays for the Plymouth Chess Club's third team.

One of the two girls competing, 15 year old Jane Anson from Devonport High School for Girls, drew.

Two primary schoolboys, although they lost managed to take Mr. Miles to over 40 moves. They were Andrew Porter of Montpelier School, and Iain Barley of Plymouth College Preparatory School.

Tony won 43; drew 5 and lost 2. This simultaneous together with one by Mr. A.R.B. Thomas have raised over £20.

A steady improvement in county results this season - could this be due to a policy of consistently reserving at least ten of the top 32 boards for juniors? The County Championship this year is a Swiss rather than a knock-out: which must be a considerable relief to local star, and several times previous holder, R.H.K. Mann; he was on the unhappy end of the first round's big upset, losing to Mervyn John, graded 57 points lower.

#### GLOUCESTERSHIRE NEWS.

The simultaneous display by Florian Gheorghiu at Arle Court was supported to an extent which can only be described as disappointing. Nearly all the top players of Cheltenham and Gloucester, like Achilles, lurked in their tents.

The 18 heroes who made the challenge to the Rumanian Grand Master were all swept aside in less than three hours and a 100 per cent score was recorded.

Even with the reservation expressed above, this was a good performance by Gheorghiu.

His victims included R.O. and M.G. Powis and R.C. Last (all of Stroud), who were the last to surrender; N. Davey, R.C. Campbell, M. Strutt, Simon Finn and J. Fetterlein of Cheltenham and R.J. Dixon of Gloucester- all regular county players.

The best resistance probably came from the young Powis, who reached an ending where both sides had a king and three pawns, but two of Powis's pawns were on the same file, and Gheorghiu quickly indicated that he knew all Zugswang!

Gheorghiu's play was quick and decisive - he always took the shortest route to win He made a beautiful queen sacrifice against Davey. His behaviour was invariably courteous, and this cannot be said of all Grand Masters. We will hope to see him again against stronger and more numerous opposition.

The final of the Gloucestershire club championship was won by Downend and Fishponds, who beat Stroud 8-2. The annual North v South match was won by the North, 27-13.

Portsmouth is now the only city in U.K. that possesses permanent charitable Chess foundations for all its young people. This, and the fact that Portsmouth now has a British Girl Champion, must afford considerable satisfaction to Miss Loe.

The Southampton Open Tournament attracted an entry of 118 players and the top prize of £100 was won by G.E.J. Lambert.
