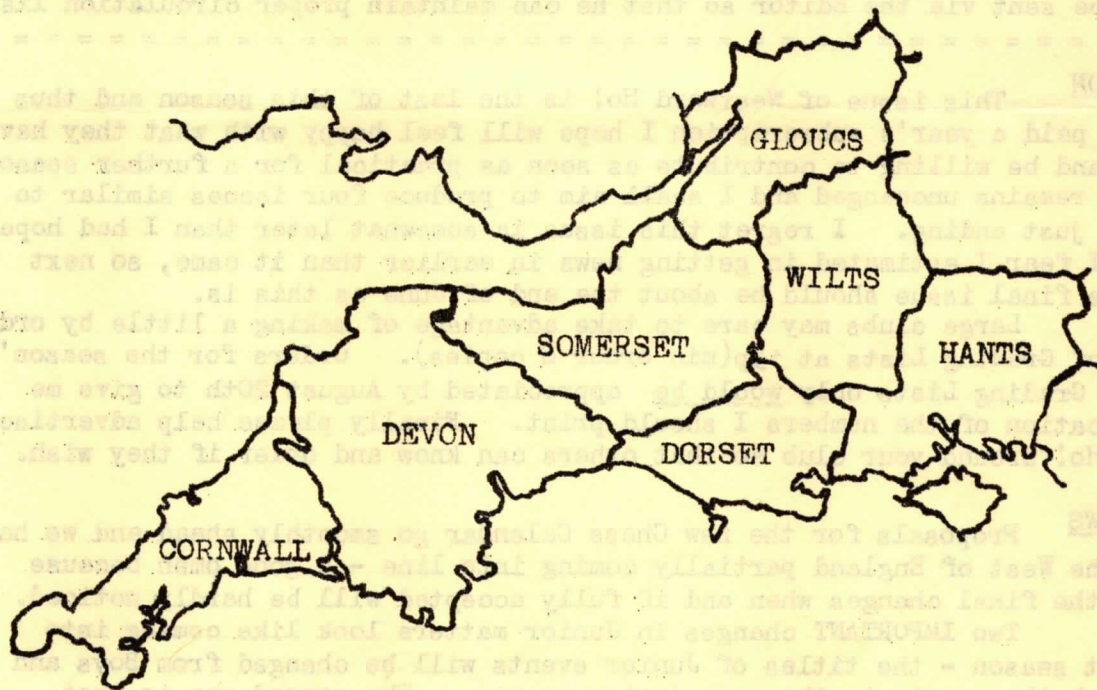

I regret this issue is somewhat later than I had hoped for, but I fear I estimated in getting news in earlier than it came, so next season the final issue should be about the end of June as this is.

Large clubs may care to take advantage of making a little by ordering a number of Grading Lists at 15p(min order 8 copies). Orders for the season's issues or Grading Lists only would be appreciated by August 20th to give me some indication of the numbers I should print. Finally please help advertise Westward Ho! around your club so that others can know and order if they wish.

B.C.F. NEWS

Proposals for the new Chess Calendar go smoothly ahead and we have already the West of England partially coming into line - a good omen because it means the final changes when and if fully accepted will be hardly noticed.

Two IMPORTANT changes in Junior matters look like coming into force next season - the titles of Junior events will be changed from Boys and Girls and both compete in the same Junior events. The second one is that the operative age will not be September 1st of that season, but September 1st of that year, ie., under the age bar on Sept 1st qualifies, over it and the player is barred.

P.S. Milner-Barry, Esq., C.B., O.B.E., has served three years as the President of the B.C.F. and is due to retire at the Council Meeting on June 30th. I feel confident all West players, Counties and even Leagues will join this Union in thanking him for wonderful progress during his period of Leadership - "Sir, we are grateful to you for all you have done".

G.H. Simmons, our previous General Secretary, and our current General Secretary have commented in reports on the machinery of the B.C.F. as it stands today, and those with experience must agree in general. However, not only have they done so, but better they have offered a glimmer of light by suggestions for improvement. Nobody denies the hopelessly large Committees and the cumbersome registration scheme - the thing to do is to get agreement to major stream-lining with possibly a completely new means of financing generally. Realisation of this is possibly the first steps to great advances along more hopeful channels.

The W.E.C.U. Council met at Taunton on May 12th and all Counties were represented.

The General Secretary reported that the Harold Meek Trophy had been won by Devon and the Wayling Cup by Dorset. The Treasurer reported an excess of income over expenditure of £66, and not seeking re-appointment, Mr I.R. Pickup was thanked for all the good work he had done.

The Junior Chess Secretary submitted a written report in which he advised that 108 Juniors had taken part in the Junior Jamboree at Exeter, Gloucestershire having won the Boys section and Devon the Girls. He stated the event cost £150 to stage. This matter leaves the West with thoughts as to whether to follow the B.C.F. and merge Boys and Girls events, or continue as we are with separate events for the years to come.

The Congress Secretary reported that 90 players had taken part in the Union's Congress, held at Newquay at Easter. A Broche is being produced on this Congress and those who want copies for full details should contact the Congress Secretary. Attending myself, I had looked forward to some good Cornish weather but regretfully I experienced some of the coldest weather of the winter for me, the winds being bitter. However this was largely counterbalanced by the unique and delightful Cornish welcome we strangers got on all sides. Added to this was a pleasant and well heated playing hall, so that one was cosy once inside. Of the 90 players taking part, 20 were Cornishmen which shows well the support that was given to this Union event.

Westward Ho! was reported as showing a credit of £23 for the accounts year - somewhat misleading as really this issue should be charged against that amount, but from this year on, matters will right themselves.

With the exception of the Hon. Treasurer and the Match Captain, all other Officers were re-elected to their various positions. The change of Match Captains however means that Mr R.H.T. Newman joins the Selection Committee in place of the retiring Match Captain, Mr M.E. Bridgen.

The Selection Committee agreed that the Champion from every W.E.C.U. county would receive an automatic entry to the Union Championship if he/she desired but that such entry must be endorsed by the County Secretary.

The Union decided to enter the Minor Counties Championship with Counties being given a choice as to where they entered their teams, but generally the Championship would be the first 16 boards and the Minor Counties section be decided by a second 16 boards - 32 boards in all if counties entered teams in both sections. Cornwall has opted for Minor Counties participation only and Dorset and Wilts will, this coming season, enter teams in the Championship only. This is of course the counties free choice and they can alter their position from year to year as they wish.

Mr R.H.T. Newman's 120 Grading Bar teams are being given a start off this year at the Union Jamboree at Exeter on Oct 6th next and it is to be hoped that club, league or county teams will roll up for this in numbers - an excellent chance for the lowly player to savour the real Chess World with all its attractions to players everywhere.

Tournament Rule 8, Appendix 3 had the following sentence added to its end, "Where time allows for $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours play (excluding intervals) the rate of play shall be 42 moves in 105 minutes".

It was agreed that the Union should purchase not more than £50 worth of clocks for use at congresses, jamborees, etc.

On County boundaries there was considerable discussion and it was proposed that the B.C.F. should be advised that players should be given the option of remaining affiliated to the counties for which they were registered before boundary changes, or if they so wished to become affiliated to their new county.

It was decided that the Harold Meek Trophy should in future be presented to the County winning the W.E.C.U. Section of the Counties Championship and that the Wayling Cup would be presented to the county winning the Minor Counties W.E.C.U. section.

Mr R.H.T. Newman has kindly offered to provide a new Cup for the Under-120 Grade teams winners, this coming season as a Jamboree but it is hoped that this could become a major sized league in years to come.

The winners of the W.E.C.U. Easter Congress were:-

Championship D.M. Wise $4\frac{1}{2}/6$ with D.A. Lemoir having a similar score but losing on S.O. scores. P.H. Clarke and P.J. Meade were equal 3rd with 4.

Challengers. C.J. Hutchings $4\frac{1}{2}/6$, winning from H.E. Courtney on S.O. Score on same games score, whilst C.A.S. Damant was third with 4.

The Reserves was won by R.C. Last with $5/6$ whilst W.G. Oliver and J. Hampson won the two All-Play-All sections. The Open Championship was a triple tie between H.G. Ditmar, C.R. Haynes and J.P. Knee. The Junior Championship went to S. Taulbut with $5\frac{1}{2}/6$, The Minor to S. Williams $5\frac{1}{2}/6$ and the Girls to Jane Anson $5/6$ without

The first prize and the Cotswold Champion Title went to the wellknown Essex player, Dr P.W. Hempson 5½. Second was M.E. Poolake, wellknown in Bristol Chess circles and playing well for his grading of 171.

The Reserves was won by D.M. Hill 5½, D. Herbert of Marling School getting 5. Gloucester player R.J. Dixon of Gloucester and J.C.B. Date of Cheltenham tying for 3rd place with 4½.

Sorry, I have no news of the Gloucestershire A.G.M., possibly it has not yet taken place, and so I cannot report any changes of Officers for this county. (See later news, page 8.)

HAMPSHIRE

The Hampshire League winners were Southampton, closely followed by University (with same points score) and Kinson (5 Pts behind) Andover were winners of the 2nd Division, followed by University B and Portsmouth B, 2nd.

The Portsmouth Chess League clear winners are Leigh Park, whilst the Division 2 lead is shared by .B.M. 'A' and Portsmouth B at the moment.

The Bournemouth League was won by Bournemouth Knights with Parkstone A a close second. Bournemouth School, with their young Senior and Junior local Champion P.R. Davies, easily won the 2nd Division. Third Division winners were Canford Heath.

This last Season G.H. Bennett won the Hampshire title, the Hampshire Lightning title and also the Southern Counties Chess Union Individual Championship. Second in the Hampshire Title Tournament was S. Weeramantry with 6 points and P.M. Collins scored 5½.

In the Lightning event, G.H. Bennett scored 10½/12, C. Cubitt 9½, S. Weeramantry 9 and D. Everett (Southampton University) 8.

In the Southend Congress at Easter, G.H. Bennett scored 5/7 for the SCCU Title and in the Under-18 section G.E.J. Lambert of Portsmouth won the grading prize.

At the Hampshire A.G.M. J.E.C. Grant, 2 Cams Bay Close, Fareham, Hants PO16 8PS remains Secretary (Fareham 3046) and H.L. Parsons was re-elected Match Captain, 29 Little Lances Hill, Bitterne, Southampton. SU2 4DU (Southampton 49166). M.P. Collins did not seek re-election as the County Grader as he is moving to Berkshire and Commander A.J. Peters, Portsmouth Grader, takes on the County task.

The Bournemouth Kinson Congress was won by G.H. Bennett and M.W.J. Thompson, both scoring 5½/6 and drawing their own game. The Under-16 event was won by T.P. Love of Portsmouth with two Dorset Bryanston School boys, C. Button and S. Carpenter with J.T. Matthews of Reading being equal 2nd. Matthews and Button by virtue of his home in Guildford share the SCCU Title. The Under-14 winner was M. Charter of Bournemouth School with 5 equal seconds. P. Fenton of London won the Under-12 Section. Best Girl Louise Trewavas of Wokingham.

In the Annual Echo Match between Bournemouth and Southampton, the former lost badly by 20/30 - G.H. Bennett going down to C. Cubitt, but H.D. Needham beat the strong player, M.W.J. Thompson on board 2, whilst the Bournemouth Senior and Junior Title Holder, P.R. Davies (U-15) drew on board 3 with D.W. Bell.

In the Southampton-Portsmouth Schools match, Southampton Schools U-15 lost $7\frac{1}{2}$ - $16\frac{1}{2}$ despite the match being played in Southampton at Bitterne Park School. The U-12 Section, playing a double round, tied with 10 all.
