

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PAIGNTON CONGRESS - SEPTEMBER, 1980.

180 players of all ages and strenths took part in the 1980 Congress at Oldway Mansions, Paignton. A new tournament - the "Morning Open" - received sufficient support for its future continuance and was won by A.K. Swift. The Premier was won outright by Dr. P.W. Hempson of Sheffield with an impressive $6\frac{1}{2}$ points out of 7. The two equal strength sections of the Challengers were won by J. Horrocks (6/7) from London and D. Costelow ($5\frac{1}{2}/7$) from Solihull.

Once again, this famous Congress was enjoyed by all and under the overall control of the Devon C.C.A. President, Mrs. Joan Parker, went smoothly and happily. Many of the competitors come year after year and not only does the Congress provide excellent chess in first class playing conditions but becomes a social gettogether for chess friends from all over the Country.

WOOLACOMBE CONGRESSES - OCT., 1980.

Three congresses in 10 days at a luxury hotel on the Golden Coast of North Devon! This year the Hexagon surpassed themselves in organisation and efficiency. In addition to the two week-end congresses, an open 5 round Swiss ran from Monday to Friday, so it was possible to play 15 games over the 10 day period. As value for money these Congresses need a lot of beating. The Voolacombe Bay Hotel is right on the front and provides facilities for indoor or outdoor swimming, a pitch and putt course, squash courts, snocker, badminton and table tennis. In addition, players who lose their queens in moments of mental aberration have the choice of drowning their sorrows in one of two bars. What more can one ask for?

15TH TORBAY CHESS CONGRESS

Held at the Victoria Hotel, Torquay, this Congress is growing in popularity and attracts players from far and wide. Each year, more and more juniors are attracted to this delightful congress which provides three sections varying in strength from the Open to the Graded Swiss for players of 135 and below.

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WEST OF ENGLAND JAMBOREE, 1980

The opening event of the Test of England Chess Season and the biggest individual gathering of west of England chess players this year attracted 12 teams of 12 players. The Senior Jamboree was won by a very strong Devon team and the Graded Jamboree by T_0 rbay, who won on board count from Somerset II.

Full results :-

- Senior: Devon $9\frac{1}{2}$, Gloucester $7\frac{1}{2}$, Somerset 6 + 1A, Dorset $5\frac{1}{2}$, Hampshire 5, Cornwall $1\frac{1}{2}$ + 1A.
- <u>Graded</u>: Torbay 7, Somerset II 7, Plymouth 6¹/₂, Exeter 6, N.Devon 5¹/₂, Dorset II 5¹/₂, Cornwall II 4¹/₂.

Perhaps the most outstanding feature of the afternoon was the self-control of the N. Devon League Match Captain John Smith. At tea -time, his team looked to be set fair for winning the cup - however, fate intervened. Four - <u>yes four</u> players in winning positions gave their Queens away after tea and lost. This surely must be without precedent and the fact that John did not burst into tears or thorw a fit gives him great credit.

At a subsequent meeting of the W.E.C.U. Executive Committee, it was unanimously resolved that, owing to the grounds of expense in providing lukewarm tea. and uninteresting biscuits at a cost of approx. 50p per head, next year, there would be no tea interval. The fact that this proposal came from the Match Captain of the Union who also happens to be President of the N. Devon Chess League is purely coincidental:

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IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT TO ALL CONGRESS COMMITTEES

In this issue, I have reported on three congresses and have tried to give the players' views on the organisation, facilities etc., rather than a long list of results which are generally faithfully reported and printed in the local press. I think it is more important to the ever-growing congress playing population to know about these matters than to study a long list of names and results that they can get from other sources. I would like to report on other congresses and their facilities but, owing to lack of information, cannot do so. In the case of the three congresses reported on - this was easy, as I was playing there myself. It would be most helpful if some of the other excellent congresses run in the Union were to send me a report giving the type of information I am seeking so that it can be published. There are many of us who, having passed the bloom of youth, are anxious to play in comfortable surroundings - such as an hotel where one can fall out of bed five minutes before the start, totter down, make a move and then think continued \dots

about a small breakfast of lightly boiled aspiring and black coffee as opposed to walking half a mile through a howling gale and rain storm to arrive - late - at a draughty, leaky, unheated Nissen Hut, only to find that one has a bye. You see what I mean?

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

"Dear Mr. Newman,

I have always paid my B.C.F. Registration Fee, although I personally get nothing out of it, because I think the B.C.F. is worth supporting. I've never worried unduly or taken much interest in my grading. But I have always opposed the *I*.E.C.U's policy of withholding a person's grading unless registered with the B.C.F. I've opposed the policy simply because I dislike the W.E.C.U's hypocritical attitude on the subject.

I notice under the heading 'Publication of Grades' in the W.E.C.U's Grading Issue, the following. "The W.E.C.U. continues its policy of non-publication of unregistered players. The North of England is now doing the same.".

There's a hint of smug self satisfaction here. I was therefore very pleased in reading the B.C.F. 'News Flash' Issue 166 of the 1st September, 1980, to come across the following letter from D.H. Milton, Yorkshire Area Grader, Hull & District League Secretary and N.C.C.U. Delegate. You have probably seen it but I give it just in case.

"After reading the last two issues of Newsflash and in particular a letter from G.A.M. Boswell, Newsflash No. 164, it seems that there are some persons who would have us believe that the BCF has some responsibility for the production of the Union grading lists, which, as we should all be aware, are produced by the Unions, paid for by the Unions and compiled by voluntary workers within the Unions and it is the BCF who choose to recognise them as official grades. I spend a lot of time and money doing voluntary work on behalf of my local association, county and Union in the hope that this will be to the benefit of the chess players in these areas and I object to the BCF or any other body charging for this freely given service. Statements such as 'graders now realize that making results freely available is acting against a Counties best interests' are not substantiated by the graders within the N.C.C.U, only its officials, most of whom contribute very little towards the grading system. It is more truthful to say that 50% of the graders in the N.C.C.U. are against the present policy of the N.C.C.U. and in Yorkshire the graders are 100% against the non-publication of grades. Furthermore, I would like to know how the policy of publishing all grades is against the Counties interests; against the BCF's interests maybe.

The implication that being a BCF member gives the average grass roots player certain benefits is a figment of someone's imagination. Even officials of the BCF admit there is very little they can do for the local Leagues. The BCF supports and encourages chess at the highest levels both in senior and junior events and for the player of a higher than average ability the BCF is an essential organisation. If we want a strong nation team, strong International tournaments and a British Jorld Champion, then we must support the BCF, but please let us drop the pretence that the BCF offers more than these hopes to the player graded below 120, who represents 75% of the chess players of the county; encourage people to join, there are plenty of ways which have not been tried yet, before resorting to blackmail".

I think Mr. Milton hits the nail on the head.

(Most of this we have heard before, and, whilst all are aware that <u>any</u> decision regarding publication or non-publication must have dissenters as well as supporters, as long as the W.E.C.U. - at which the Bristol & District Chess League is fullyrepresented and has voting rights - decides by a large majority vote NOT to publish grades of unregistered players then that situation will continue. One interesting point, however, is in the final paragraph ".... players graded below 120 who represent 75% of the chess players of the country" Not many people in high places are aware of this. It is a great pity that the 7.E.C.U. Hraded Jamboree for players graded 125 and below was only supported by 7 teams - 4 of which came from chess leagues in Devon. Come on, Mr. Cleak - how about a team from the Bristol League next year: - ED).

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Extract from letter from Mr. Alex Boswell, Northern Counties, to Mrs. Joan Parker, Secretary W.E.C.U.:-

".... many thanks for the copy of "Jestward Ho! a very lively publication continued 16/5 (The rest of the letter, which to quote the previous correspondent gives me a certain smug satisfaction, I shall reserve for ammunition against my friends in the South. Thanks Mr. Boswell: - ED).

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"Dear Mr. Newman,

In the grading issue of Westward Ho! Mr RC Clark of Fareham expresses the opinion that descriptive notation has no advantages over algebraic. Let me suggest a couple : -

(1) It is in a sense "psychologically" sounder. For example, if a game begins 1 P-K4, P-K4 both sides have made the "same" move - a fact which descriptive reflects and algebraic doesn't.

(2) Descriptive is superior for discussing certain endgame concepts. It is more natural, and simpler, to talk about N pawns than "b" and "g" pawns. You will remember that FIDE promulgated a rule change not so long ago extending the 50-move rule for certain endings with King and two Knights versus King and pawn. In FIDE's version, the pawn had to be safely blocked by a Knight and

"not further advanced than: for White - a5, b3, c4, d5, e5, f4, g3 or h5

for Black - a4, b6, c5, d4, e4, f5, g6 or H4

In descriptive that translates as: "not further advanced than R5, N3, B4, Q5 or K5" and I think it gains in the translating!

Of course algebraic has advantages. It's shorter (so long as you don't'use the vile "long" form) and a damn sight easier to type. But "more precise"? Come off it, both forms have perfect precision if prperly used. It is probably true that descriptive offers more traps for the unwary, but I can't believe Mr. Clark has never seen an ambiguous algebraic notation.

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Somerset;

Grandmaster John Nunn gave a simultaneous display at King's College, Taunton on 27 September, 1980. His 36 opponents were boys from King's College and from 9 16/6 other schools in the area. After four hours, Dr. Nunn had chalked up 34 wins and had agreed draws with Matthew Rosseinsky and David Sixsmith, both of Exeter School. Reviewing the games afterwards, Dr. Nunn judged the most interesting, from his point of view, to have been the one with Kevin Rozario of King's College.

Hampshire:

All the leagues are in full swing and in the next edition up-to-date tables will be published.

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GLORNEY CUP.

In the last issue it was promised to publish a full report. At the moment, it is felt unwise to do so owing to the regrettable dispute between the British Boys' Team Manager, Mr. Brian Eley and the Controller, Mr. Terry Hollington. The cup was won by the Dutch and in the final round England was disqualified by the Controller. It is, however, proper to state that this matter was fully discussed at an Executive Meeting of the W.E.C.U. in October and unanimous support was given to Mr. Hollington. Much has been already printed in "Chess" but one clear fact emerges and that is that the English team were consistantly late in arriving for the start of each round. As host Country, in my opinion, that is not only discourteous and bad-mannered but completely inexcusable expecially in view of the fact that it would appear that, in no way, were the boys involved.

It is only to be hoped that the adverse publicity which has surrounded this event will not cause Mr. Hollington to give up the magnificent work that he, and Mr. McEvoy - the other contoller involved - give to Junior Chess.

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NEV BOOKS.

Three excellent books recently released by Oxford Press are worthy to include in your chess budget for 1981.

For the beginners "Play Chess Combinations and Sacrifices" by David Levy and "Test Your Chess" by J.N. Valker are both most helpful and logical in their approach and should prove of great value to the low-graded players.

The third book "Fischer's Chess Games" with an introduction by Raymond Keene is a gem. Cross references toopponents and openings are simple to follow and to the student seeking brilliance in technique and strategy there is material in abundance.

V.A.T. AND THE B.C.F.

Readers of the B.C.F. Newsflash will have seen the article entitled "Vatman Robbing" in the December issue, warning chess organisers that they may be liable to pay V.A.T. in 1981. True, from the 1st January competition entry fees are liable to V.A.T. - but only if the turnover of the organisation concerned exceeds £13,500.00 in one year!

It is stated in Newsflash that if income from one quarter exceeds $\pounds4,000$ it becomes necessary to register for V.A.T. - and then, if the income does not in fact exceed £13,500 for the year one has then to de-register!

My local V.A.T. official disagrees with this. In fact, he says that the last thing Customs and Excise want is for people to be registering and de-registering. I quote from the relevant leaflet :-

"As from 27 March 1980 a person who is not registered for VAT but who makes taxable supplies in the course of furtherance of any business carried on by him will be liable to be registered -

(a) at any time if there are reasonable grounds for believing that the total taxable turnover of all his business activities will be more than $\pounds 13,500$ in the next 12 months: OR

(b) if at the end of any calendar quarter (31 March, 30 June, 30 September 31 December) the total taxable turnover of all his business activities has exceeded either of the following limits:

£ 4,000 jn the last calendar quarter £13,500 in the last 4 calendar quarters

BUT HE IS NOT LIABLE IF THE COMMISSIONERS OF CUTOMS AND EXCISE ARE SATIS-FIED THAT HIS TAXABLE TURNOVER IN THE PERIOD CONCERNED AND THE REMAINDER OF THE YEAR JILL NOT EXCEED £13,500."

2000 AD.

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".... All players on arrival must report to the Security Officer who, having satisfied himself that no illegal micro chess aids are being worn, will issue a certificate to that effect. After security clearance the player will check in with the controller and produce the following documents :-

- 1. License to play chess.
- 2. Certificate of grade.
- 3. B.C.F. registration certificate.
- 4. Chess identity card.
- 5. Congress license (an endorsement on this will incur the player in paying double entrace fees).

.... During playing sessions all competitors are warned that the slightest infringement of any rule will be an endorsable offence".
