

This year, as an experiment the Congress was extended to run over the May Bank Holiday enabling 6 rounds to be played - all to a finish.

For the second year running the Congress was held at the Woolacombe Bay Hotel and proved to be more than popular attracting for the first time ever a well-known oversaes player from Holland - L. PRINS. His journey was not wasted as he won outright with 6 out of 6:

Despite a drop in numbers, probably due to the expense of a further night's accommodation, the Congress again made a profit. This was made possibe by the generosity of donors - in particular Mr. Prins who handsomely presented a very sizeable proportion of his winnings to the Congress.

#### BRITISH CHAMPIONSHIPS - TORQUAY 1982

The local Committee, formed by the West of England Chess Union, under its Chairman, Ralph Newman, met with the BCF Representatives at the Congress venue in Torquay on 19th March to discuss all aspects of publicity and other arrangements for the Congress to be held at the South Devon Technical College in August.

The College offers excellent facilities for staging the Congress and Championships. There is ample room for both players and organisers and a well-equipped refreshment canteen. Mr. Brian Hawthorne, a senior tutor at the College and a Committee member, is the local public relations officer for the Congress, and will have a team of helpers and stewards to assist in the day to day duties.

It is intended to advertise and give as much publicity as possible both before and during the Congress. To this end posters of various sizes will be displayed and literature will be distributed in the town. Arrangements are being made for chess problems to be displayed in selected shop windows for a competition, entry forms to be in the congress programme.

Entries for the Under 11 tournaments can be made to Mr. R.V. Cross ("Siga", Monksbridge Rd., Brixham, Telephone 2071) for forwarding 'en bloc' to the BCF. Schools can claim back the V.A.T. on the entry fee if they enter their pupils. If necessary, small bursaries can be applied for in cases of genuine need.

During the Congress, coach tours will be arranged if there is sufficient interest.

It is intended to hold a simultaneous display outdoors on a prominent site on the Sunday before the opening of the Congress, the BCF providing a strong player.

#### COUNTY MATCH1CONGRESSES ?

County matches originally were prestige events in which one considered it to be an honour to be asked to play. Over the years there has been a gradual change in attitudes, effected particularly, by the growth of week-end congresses, such that now with the high cost both in financial terms and in time, many players consider Congresses offering 5 or 6 games per week-end to be more attractive than county matches.

This problem has been recognised, particularly by match-captains, for some years. But all attempts to grapple with this situation have not met with a general consensus of approval.

The ideas, detailed below, are given for consideration as a possible means of dealing with the difficult situation now being faced by match-captains, and will, hopefully, initiate further discussion which may resolve the problem.

#### SCHEME A

This assumes that we have seven participating counties and that all are playing over the same number of boards.  $T_h$  ere would be three two-day weekend congresses, and each county would take part in two of them, These congresses would completely resolve the county match programme.

#### Congress 1

Participating Counties: Dorset, Hampshire, Somerset & Wiltshire.

Possible Venue: Weymouth or Bournemouth

#### Congress 2

Participating Counties: Cornwall, Devon, Gloucestershire & Somerset.

Possible Venue: Burnham-on-Sea

Round 1 Cornwall v Devon Gloucestershire v Somerset
Round 2 Cornwall v Somerset Gloucestershire v Devon
Round 3 Somerset v Devon Gloucestershire v Cornwall

#### Congress 3

Participating Counties: All but Somerset

Possible Venue: Exeter or Taunton

Round 1 Cornwall v Wiltshire Devon v Dorset Glos. v Hampshire Round 2 Cornwall v Dorset Devon v Hampshire Glos. v Wiltshire Round 3 Cornwall v Hampshire Devon v Wiltshire Glos. v Dorset.

Obviously variations can be made to the order of the congresses and to the counties participating, the arrangement detailed minimises the travelling in the first two congresses, and would permit them to be held at a resort where reasonable accommodation can be obtained even in the winter.

The suggested timing for each congress would be :

Round 1 Saturday 1.00 - 5.00 Round 2 Saturday 6.30 - 10.30 Round 3 S unday 9.00 - 1.00 Adjournemnts Sunday 2.30 - 4.30

#### Advantages

- 1. Allows for adjournments (there are some who may not consider this an advantage).
- 2. Complete County Match programme completed by each county by attending two week-end Congresses.

#### Disadvantages

- 1. Venue requires for 96 boards for the third congress.
- 2. Accommodation requirement for up to 192 people for the third congress.

#### SCHEME B

This is an alternative arrangement if one of our counties does not wish to take part in the scheme, or does not play over 32 boards. (The latter currently applies to Viltshire, and for this reason the programme detailed below assumes that this remains to be the case). In this scheme there is only one week-end congress in which the six participating counties each play four matches over the week-end. The remaining two matches of the county programme will be one with Viltshire over 16 boards, and a local 'derby' match between neighbouring counties.

#### Advantages

1. Only one week-end congress required.

2. Great flexibility in arranging the 'remaining prgramme'.

#### Disadvantages

1. As for Scheme A

2. No provision for adjournments.

In conclusion, it is worth remembering that many variations of the congress county-match idea can be arranged. Consequently, if agreement between all counties on this scheme cannot be obtained, but there were sufficient in favour of the approach, a scheme for those may be feasible.

#### COUNTY MATCH FIXTURES

The V.E.C.U. Council will meet on 5th June 1982, when, amongst other things they will be planning the Programme and Fixture List for the 1982/3 Season.

Under the present system county matches are played on seven Saturdays throughout the season, one county having the 'bye' on one of the Saturdays.

It is apparent that Match Captains are finding it increasingly difficult to raise a team to travel many miles for the one match, and the crowded calendar adds to the difficulties. Therefore, the Council will be seeking ways in which county matches can be played with an economy of time and travel.

I would like to put forward a plan for playing two county matches on one Saturday, thus halving travel costs, helping to reduce the humber of Saturdays taken up, and without the cost of overnight accommodation.

It would involve four county teams meeting together, playing the first match at 10.00am (&r 10.30am) and the second one at 3.00pm (or 3.30pm) with a break for lunch between. If all seven counties are taking part then twenty-one matches have to be played and can be arranged as the following table shows:

Counties numbered 2 and 6 would need to meet on a separate date and would be two near-by counties who could arrange their match early in the season. For them the plan would involve four Saturdays (instead of the present six) but for the other five counties taking part only three Saturdays would be required in which to complete the programme.

#### CHESS CONGRESSES

Few counties, if any, can have more chess congresses than Devon. The official congress of the D.C.C.A. has been held continously for 31 years at Oldway Mansion, Paignton.

This is primarily a holiday congress as competitors bring their families and combine their play with the family holiday.

The format of the congress has changed little over the years and reflects the more leisurely times of yore. Only one round is played per day and all seven rounds are played to a finish without any artificial changes in the rate of play.

Oldway Marsion provides one of the finest settings of any congress and with the local authority providing free use of the putting green and deck chairs as well as parking at the venue and their usual rece ption, the social and holiday atmosphere pervades the whole week.

Although there have been several secretaries, Ron Bruce, who was repsonsible for the arrangements for the first congress in 1951, has remained the driving force and Chairman of the committee responsible for the programme which comprises Premier, Challangers, Swiss tournaments, morning and afternoon American sections and veteran and restricted grading tournaments for the lower graded competitors. An exceptionally large number of ladies play in the congress.

A cafe operates in the building, and accommodation of every description is available within walking distance of Oldway.

This year's 32nd congress starts on Sunday, 5th September, and ends the following Saturday. Programmes can be obtained from Phil Short, Blue Horizon, Nut Bush Lane, Shiphay, Torquay, TQ2 6LD.

A Devon junior congress started soon after the Paignton Congress operated at Plymouth College in the week after Christmas each year. In this all the Devon Junior Championships and the Lloyds Bank Junior International Tournament were held until 1979 when the congress changed its complexion.

Open, Major and Minor Tournaments are now held and the congress is organised by the Plymouth Chess Club. The congress is sponsored by Unigate and the juniors are still well-catered for with reduced entry fees and special prizes, but they now play on level terms with their seniors.

The Assembly Hall at Plymouth College offers spacious playing conditions in quiet, secluded surroundings although close to shops and city centre. There are several good small hotels bearby, but the large hotels in the Hoe area are about two miles distant. (The provisional dates for the 30th Plymouth Congress are 28/30 December 1982).

One day Quick-Play congresses are growing in popularity in Devon. The first was at Holsworthy where a British Master is a guest player each July in a nineround Swiss tournament.

More recently, there have been several new congresses in which six 1 hour rounds are played with each player starting with a half-hour on the clock.

Ken Butt started the Plymouth Quick-play congress at the College of Further Education. At first it was for juniors only, but now comprises an Open tournament with strong national players competing, as well as junior tournaments.

The Teignmouth Club staged their first Quick-play congress in March with a similar programme except that the Open was restricted to players graded up to 180, and in May the Pallace, Paignton Club hold a similar congress at the South Devon Technical College, Torquay, which is the venue for this year's British Championship.

The idea of a Grand Prix for the series of Devon Quick-play congresses has been mooted and there are attractions in this idea as it should encourage players to take part in as many as possible.

However, some rationalisation might be necessary, whereas variety in the length of play, number of rounds and grading limits which exists at present appeals to many.

Perhaps a formula can be found such as a number of grand prix at various grading levels that would enable all congresses to be included without the necessity for them to conform to one set pattern. At least such an idea would maintain the interest of a large number of players as against the system that really only concerns a small number of leading players.

The solution to the three move problem from the Guernsey Festival of Chess which was given in the last Westward Ho! was :- 1. Ra8 Kb5 2. Ka7 Ka4 3. Kb6mate.

Ellery gave so much for chess. His activities in the London Chess League were well known, but he will probably be remembered for his Chairmanship of the Management Committee, when he steered it through the difficult transitionary years that led to the ultimate reorganisation of the whole of the structure and administrative reorganisation of that august body.

He was unanimously elected as President of this new re-structured constitution in 1976 and served his term of office with dedication and zeal until he retired in 1978.
