## Avon Calling...

Tyson Mordue (Keynsham) will qualify for the 1996 British Championships after finishing 4th= at the Paignton Congress, assuming that Graeme Buckley's IM title is confirmed. It's been a good year for Tyson; his name is also going forward as a BCF Arbiter.

Melanie Buckley is the new Bristol Junior Champion (U-18), having finished $1 / 2$ point clear of Peter Chaplin and her brother David. Younger brother Simon won the U11 Section with a 6 point clean sweep, and 7 year old Sam, competing against the U-10s and U-9s, took that section also with another $100 \%$ score. In the absence of any Buckleys at all, the U13 Section finished in a tie between Oliver Bright and Robert Pritchard. Apart from the last named, all the rest are from the Keynsham Club too!

Bristol played two matches against a touring Hanover side. Both were drawn, the first at 2-2 and the second $31 / 2-31 / 2$.
The Germans stopped over to compete in the first Black Swan Rapidplay, where their Andreas Zachmann shared first place in the Major Section with David Woodruff (Keynsham!). Derek Pugh (Keynsham!!)
took the Open Title, followed by Grendel's Dave Osborne.

The 8th Hanham Congress saw a 6-way tie in the Premier Section, with not a single Keynsham player in sight. ExBritish Champion Alan Phillips of Stockport shared 1st prize with Jeremy Menadue (Truro), Graham Copeland (Downend), Paul Lesniowski (Bristol University), Ian White (Gloucester) and Dave Collier (Bristol \& Clifton)

The Major Section was won by Stewart Hall-Roberts (Grendel) half a point ahead of Andrew Borkowski (Clevedon) and Mark Whitehead (Rochdale). The Intermediate was won by Paul Spiller (Downend) while the Minor Tournament was won jointly by John Griffee (Downend) and 9 year old Krunal Kahar of the Musketeers Club. Downend also took the team title.

In the Bristol \& District League, last year's champions, Grendel, lead Division 1, while a Buckley-ridden Keynsham top the 2nd Division.

Chess is generally thriving in the city thanks to the introduction of a Grand Prix competition, where players can accumulate points throughout the season, competing in a variety of events. Current leader is Dave Osborne. And you don't even have to be a player to join in the fun, as we have the Bristol Fantasy Chess League. Introduced last year, this has proved a great success. The one snag is that if you do play, you have to pick yourself in the team.

## Devon

## Paignton Congress

TThe Paignton Congress, one of the country's most venerable competitions, is faced with something of a dilemma. It's traditional pattern of a 7 day congress with a steadily-paced game a day played in the magnificent ambience of Oldway Mansion, makes it something of a rarity on today's congress circuit. This undoubtedly makes it a treasured institution to the many that enter every year, combining, as it does, a chess event with a week by the seaside in late summer when the kids are back at school. On the other hand, the pace of life generally and the chess scene in particular has changed so radically since the early post war years that the congress committee is being forced to re-think fundamentals.

For example, for four decades, the committee was lucky to have the Torbay Borough Council on its side; in return for attracting visitors to Torbay in September, thus helping to extend the holiday season the Council permitted the use of Oldway free of charge. The Mayor even laid on an annual mid-week reception for players, partners, officials and sponsors. In recent years, however, with local authorities' finances being squeezed, they have had to charge an economic rent and the reception has gone. This in turn has put a great strain on congress finances.

Also, there has been a gradual decline in attendance over the years. Has this been because a changing life-style has made the week-long congress less popular? Or has the recession made a week at the sea-side too expensive for many? Or has the explosion of other congresses in recent years merely spread entries more thinly? Probably a potent mixture of all these reasons has combined to whittle away the
number of entries at Paignton by just a handful each year.

The committee has had to give consideration to possible changes to try to arrest this decline. But how far should they go? Too many changes will undoubtedly change the character of the event and alienate the regulars; too few may not be enough to produce the desired effect - increased entries and a healthy bank balance!

However, Congress Secretary, Ben Wilkinson, Treasurer John Dunleavy and Devon President Ivor Annetts, have given much thought to the problem and are now confident they have come up with a package of measures that will achieve the desired effects without alienating too many of the devotees. They are looking ahead to the 1996 congress in a positive frame of mind.

Also, Devon stalwart, John Wheeler, has helped to form a Friends of the Paignton Congress organisation that now makes donations to Congress funds.

The 1995 Paignton Congress reached a dramatic climax when, in the last round of the Ron Bruce Premier, GM-elect Keith Arkle needed to beat Paignton ex-pat Gary Lane, in order to draw level with IM-elect Graeme Buckley on $6 / 7$. The steady rate of play at Paignton means that games can go on a bit as players have better chances of finding the best continuations. In this case, the game turned into the following 70 move marathon that continued doggedly in an empty hall long after all other games were over.

Arkle wins a piece for two passed pawns, but has to strive manfully to make something of it. For ages he seems to be getting nowhere, then it ends suddenly when white's last piece goes.

## Dorset

Congratulations to the Dorset 1st team for their unprecedented success in qualifying for the National stages.

The following bit of end-game analysis comes from their match with Devon. As the match went to the final minutes of extra time a crowd of spectators gathered round to watch the following see-saw endgame on board 1. As John Wheeler explains, he felt he was winning, went on to lose, but, on reflection, thinks he should have managed to draw. Here he analyses his personal contribution to Dorset's success.......

I was black and and had been under pressure for most of the game, but emerged from the time scramble with a piece up and the move in the following position after white's 41 st.


Being a piece up I naturally thought I was winning. Then I noticed that white already has 2 outside passed pawns on the Queen's side and a potential third on the other wing. He was not yet about to resign. Also, my pawns only help to block the bishop. Who, if anyone, is winning this position? The game continued thus:

But the checks soon petered out, White got his third Queen, the fifth of the game, and won.
Of course, white didn't have to play 46. Kd6. He could have gone for 46. Kd4 after which neither side can make progress. So it's a draw. Not what either of us was expecting. Or have I still missed something....?

Maybe my first move was wrong. Does 41.....Kc6 prove better? It could then go 42. h4 Bd3; 43. a7 Kb7; 44. Kxe6 d4 45. Kd5 winning the d pawn and securing at least a draw for white. And $42 \ldots . \mathrm{Bg} 6$ leads to 43 . h5 Be8 44. Kd4 and neither side can make progress again. $44 \ldots \mathrm{Bd} 7$ loses to 45. g5. so Black must play $44 . .$. Bf7 allowing 45. Ke5 Be8; 46. Kd4 drawn It seems to be a draw whichever way you look at it.

# Book Review: 

Dr. Dave Regis of Exeter University, casts his eye over a recent Cadogan publication:

Taimanov's Selected Games

by Mark Taimanov (tr. Ken Neat)
Cadogan 1995 viii+198pp.

Among the cream of chess literature have always been game collections: those of Alekhine, Fischer and our own John Nunn are among my (and surely others') favourites. There can be few more pleasurable experiences than reading well-annotated GM games. Mark Taimanov has recently added his contribution in this nicely produced book from Cadogan. How does it sit in the canon?

Taimanov, like many other Russian authors, enjoys verbal exposition more than the interesting variations given by Fischer, and he has not been so immodest as to exclude draws, mistakes or losses, (and in this respect scores over Alekhine), although he shows off his finest achievements with justifiable pride.

This collection stretches from a game played in 1938 (at 12 years of age) to 1993, and includes games from the arenas of the USSR Championship and the World Candidates' tournaments. Unusually for a collection of this type, the games are not arranged chronologically but by theme, as follows:

1. Games won... at Home (opening preparation)
2. Strategical concepts in opposition (KID, Sicilian, NID)
3. Storming the Royal Fortress (uncastled, castled, opposite castling, attack with small army, counterattack)

## 4. By Technique Alone

This thematic organisation makes the book more than usually instructive, but there is colour too. There are illuminating personal glimpses, for example in his long battle against a 17-year-old Bobby Fischer at Portoroz 1958(*), and in the account of his other Fischer near-miss in the 1971 Candidate's match, where after 2 pages of dense analysis he concludes endearingly:
"Perhaps the position also harbours other secrets, but, to be honest, after all the endless analyses it provokes in me feelings of anguish".
On the instructional side, there is much to be gained in the understanding of openings. As a lifelong 1.d4 player Taimanov has brought many new ideas to the Indian Defences, e.g. 9.64 and 9.Nd2 in the Classical King's Indian, 4...Nc6 for Black in the Nimzo, 4.Bg5 for White in the Grunfeld, and of course there is his system with ...Nge7 in the Sicilian. The opening preparation is interesting for an insight into GM homework, but even better are the sections of the second chapter, which are actually little monographs on the strategy of each defence.

Among the games less dominated by opening themes there is quality, drama and depth. The quality is seen in several brilliancy and best game prizes, including his victory over Petrosian at Zurich 1953.

Here's a bit of drama:


Can you find Taimanov's win as Black in this position against World Champion Karpov in 1977? Champions play so much these days that many GMs have a win against one in their lives, but this must have been quite special.

And depth? I have often read elsewhere what Taimanov says in his notes to his game with Averbach in 1949:

> "In positional play the
> accumulation of advantages usually proceeds via their transformation".

But Taimanov gives the whole thing a nice crisp analysis, and shows the sort of subtlety needed to beat GMs. He makes this comment after the moves:

1. d2-d4 Ng8-f6 2. c2-c4 e7-e6 3. Nb1-c3 Bf8-b4
2. e2-e3 O-O 5. Bf1-d3 d7-d5 6. Ng1-f3 b7-b6 7.

O-O Bc8-b7 8. Bc1-d2 d5xc4 9. Bd3xc4 Nb8-d7
10. Qd1-e2 c7-c5 11. a2-a3 Bb4xc3 12. Bd2xc3

Nf6-e4 13. Ral-c1, and adds:
"Thus here White is immediately prepared to part with one of his bishops in order to activate his forces along the half-open c-file. From this point of view 13. Rfcl was a more cunning move, in order to 'frighten' the opponent with the possibility of Be1 and urge him to make the exchange, which would have allowed White to save a tempo on doubling rooks"

His play in this game reminded me of Capablanca, the finish also being similar to a famous win of Capa over Nimzovitch.

I enjoyed this book a great deal; I don't think in terms of the games or annotations it is outstanding, but I was offered entertainment and illumination throughout.

# 1st Reinfeld Memorial Tournament

Fred Reinfeld, as many older readers will know, was a most prolific writer of chess books, most of them for beginners, and a whole generation in the immediate post-war period was brought up on his works. Although Reinfeld was American, there is a connection with the Frome area, as his books were published in the U.K by either Pitmans of Bath or Butler \& Tanner of Frome.

Frome resident Brian Gosling felt it would be a good idea to link Reinfeld's name with a new tournament for juniors that he had been planning for some time, and Butler \& Tanner came up with a very generous donation to make this possible. His idea was to set up a situation where promising juniors from the locality could play against strong opponents. Both sections of the tournament, the Championship and Challengers were keenly contested.

The strongest junior, Jack Rudd of Yeovil, could hardly be called "promising", having recently got a $50 \%$ score in the British Championship in the summer. He is a very difficult player to play against because he plays his moves so quickly, and this puts his opponents under a great pressure to which they usually succumb. He duly won the Championship, but not all games went his way. Joe Hurd, on vacation from Cambridge University, scored a valuable win against the Champion. This helped Joe, a popular member of the Frome Club, to secure 2nd place. Peter Chaplin from Weston-Super-Mare, a former British U-16 Champion, gained third prize.

The Challengers proved a very interesting Tournament with a strong Frome presence. Richard Pinder of Yeovil won the section with a
$100 \%$ score，but Richard O＇Grady had a wonderful opportunity to take a point away from the winner．Ryan Taylor，another Frome starlet， played well above his grade to come a worthy second．Nathan O＇Grady，a very promising 7 yr． old，got off to a slow start but finished strongly to win third prize．

# East Devon Congress 

Exeter 1st - 3rd March

This popular event came of age with 204 entrants taking part in the 21st East Devon Congress.

The "Stars-Barred" Premier section, with a ceiling grade of 200 , proved attractive to players approaching master strength, and found young tigers Jack Rudd and Andrew Greet fighting it out in the last round for first prize. But more of this later.

The Major (<150) was won outright by local boy Mark Blackmore, ahead of a chasing pack of six players half a point behind.

Keynsham stalwart, Mauro Farina, added another Intermediate title to the one he won at Torbay in the autumn, in this case ahead of five others.

Now for some of the action. The Premier was won in style by Jack Rudd, and as Brian Gosling said in his article on the Reinfeld Memorial Tournament, a feature of Rudd's play is the speed of his moves. Brian feels that this alone puts extra pressure on his opponents, an added burden that helps to crack them. Interestingly, Jack is one of those precise characters who make a note of all clock times on their scoresheet, so it's easy to calculate how long each player devotes to each move. In this congress, for example, he was faced by five very worthy opponents and was allowed a grand total of $131 / 2$ hours thinking time for the five games. Of these 810 minutes at his disposal he needed a mere 96 ; less than 50 seconds a move to beat the current West of England Champion, the British Under 13 Champion, a former Cornish Champion and a draw against a four-times British Ladies Champion.

A quick look at all five games to see how this was done.

## Round 5

Now back on course, in Round 5, Rudd met Andrew Greet, at 16 already a former Cornish Champion and British Under 12 Champion. Greet was in the sole lead with maximum points and only needed a draw to be sure of at least a share of first prize. So caution should have been his watchword. On the other hand, he had only just finished an 87 move marathon against Sheila Jackson, and must have been feeling somewhat shattered. All the more need for caution then.......
