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
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A MESSAGE from THE SPONSORS

ACROSS THE BOARD

THE NEW CHESS COMPUTER BOOK 2nd Edition

T D HARDING

This entirely revised edition of The Chess Computer Book contains more than 50% new material. Written in the last quarter of 1983 and early 1984, it looks forward to likely developments in the next 5 years. It includes several completely new chapters, including one about chess programmes for home computers.

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Gary Kasparov is not only one of the most exciting chess prospects of all times, he is also a profound and penetrating author. This collection of his writings covers all his major chess events from 1978 to 1984, culminating in his victories in the World Championship Candidates Matches. The annotations are of particular value, since Kasparov has updated them to take account of earlier analytical mistakes and of developments in opening theory. His self-critical approach - alongside his most brilliant wins he includes six losses and nearly thirty draws - helps to explain why, at the early age of 22, he has become the youngest World Champion in history.

This book covers every game played in the championship, supported by detailed and penetrating commentary and annotations by the young champion. It provides the definitive account of the championship, as well as an insight into the strategy and tactics employed by Kasparov in his victory.

SICILIAN: POISONED PAWN VARIATION

The Poisoned Pawn or Fischer Variation is an exceptionally sharp line of the Najdorf Variation. Much of the analysis contained in this book is derived from Soviet, Yugoslav and Hungarian sources, together with analyses from America, Britain and West Germany. Main variations, sub-variations and alternatives to each main line game are discussed, together with typical middlegame and endgame positions resulting from the Poisoned Pawn openings.

Veterans', Under-18, 16, 15, 14, 13, 12, All-Play-All Tournaments, 5-Day one round per day: 40 moves in 2 hours followed by 20 moves per hour.

Under-11: 45 moves in 2 hours followed by 25 moves per hour.

Other events: See below.

ADJOURNMENTS

All events, other than those below, will be played with full adjournments. Subject to the direction of the Chief Arbiter, adjournments sessions will be 2.30 to 6.30 pm., 8.30 to 10.30 p.m., 9.30 to 11.30 am. Adjourned games must be played off as soon as possible.

QUICK-PLAY EVENTS

The British Under-9 Championship is played at the rate of all the moves in one hour. Help will be given to children unused to the handling of clocks.

The Kleinwort Grieveson Open Quick-Play is played at the rate of all moves in 30 minutes.

The rules for these events can be found in the BCF Year Book.

QUICK-PLAY (ALLEGRO) FINISH EVENTS

5-Day two rounds per day Swiss and Weekend Tournaments. These will be played at the rate of 40 moves in 100 minutes followed by all the moves in 20 minutes. The rules for these events can be found in the BCF Year Book.

NOTICE OF PAIRINGS

For events of one round per day, every attempt will be made to post the draw for each round as follows:

The controllers will do their best to post the draw earlier, but cannot answer any enquiries.

Games unfinished when the work on pairings commences will be provisionally 'adjudicated' for that purpose.

SWISS PAIRINGS

The BCF Seeded Swiss Pairing System will be used in the Kleinwort Grieveson British Championship, the Ladies' Open Championship, the Major Open, 5-Day one round per day tournaments, Weekend and Quick-Play Tournaments. The Major Open will use Accelerated Pairings in order to maximise encounters between internationally rated players and strong opponents. Details of the rules can be found in the BCF Year Book.

The BCF lottery system will be used in other tournaments.

PRIZECIVING

The Prizegiving and Closing Ceremony will take place at 9.30 am on Saturday, 9 August.

The President of the West of England Chess Union, Peter Marshall Esq., will be in the Chair.

John Brew Esq. will represent Kleinwort Grieveson, The Right Worshipful the Mayor of Southampton, Councillor Jack Candy, will be in attendance.

There will be a prizegiving for first week tournaments at 8 pm on Friday, 1 August, and for weekend tournaments as soon as possible on Sunday, 3 August.

All prizewinners should attend the prizegiving; not to do so is inconsiderate and discourteous to sponsors and organisers. Absentees will have their prizes withheld.

KLEINWORT GRIEVESON SPECIAL PRIZES

Maximum Score: a score of 11/11 in the Kleinwort Grieveson British Championship will earn a prize of £10,000.

Best Game Prizes: there will be a prize of £200 for the Best Game in the Kleinwort Gricveson British Championship and one of £50 for the Best Game in any other tournament. Entries must be submitted within two days of the end of the game; games played after 5 August must be submitted as soon as the game is over. They should be clearly marked with the round and event and handed in to the Press Officer, Mike Wagstaff.

Best Swindle Prize: there will be a Best Swindle Prize of £25 from any tournament. Entries to Mike Wagstaff, as above.

PROMOTIONS AND EXEMPTIONS

CHAMPIONSHIP

Anyone scoring 7½ or more will receive free entry to the 1987 Kleinwort Grieveson British Championship.

JUNIOR (UNDER-21) CHAMPION

The British Under-21 Champion (decided by position in the British Championship) will receive free entry to the 1987 Kleinwort Grieveson British Championship.

MAJOR OPEN TOURNAMENT

The three highest-placed eligible players and the highest-placed eligible under-21 will receive free entry to the 1987 Kleinwort Grieveson British Championship.

LEIGH GRAND PRIX

Results of tournaments qualifying for Leigh Grand Prix points will be included in the Leigh circuit.

CONDUCT OF PLAYERS

Stewart Reuben and his team seek to maintain the highest standards at the British Championships. It would help the smooth running of the events if players could bear the following points in mind.

REPORTING OF RESULTS

Both players must hand in the top copy of their scoresheet promptly after the game. This speeds up the next round draw, assists the media, and stops the Control Team wondering if they've lost a result.

DISCUSSION OF GAMES

Players must not discuss their game while they are playing. Nor should you ask another player about his/her game, as your reaction to their reply might be construed as comment or advice. If someone asks you how your own game is going, you should decline to answer. While you are playing, please do not visit the Bookstall or analyse or play through someone else's game.

ADJOURNMENTS

Players not used to playing adjournment sessions should note that:

An illegal sealed move will cost you the game as probably will one which is illegible or ambiguous.

The clock should not be stopped until the scoresheets are in the envelope sealed, and the clock should only be stopped by the player sealing. If your opponent is sealing, please assist him/her by quietly completing the envelope and putting your own scoreshect into it.

You can only seal before the end of the session if you take the unused time on your clock. Also you must have satisfied all relevant time controls.

You will lose by default if you are more than one hour late for an adjournment session even if you had more than an hour left on your clock.

DEFAULTS AND WITHDRAWALS

Players who default or withdraw without good reason will be refused entry to future Congresses. If you are obliged to withdraw, please tell the Chief Arbiter promptly.

SMOKING

Smoking if the playing hall is restricted to players and then only while their game is in progress.

FIVE-MINUTE CHESS

Playing speed chess with tournament clocks is forbidden. Indeed, no 'friendly' games in the tournament area during play are permitted.

Clocks may be hired for playing speed chess in the analysis room. There is a £5 deposit and a charge of 50p per day. Please enquire of an arbiter.

APPEALS

Appeals may be made against a controller's decision on matters of the laws of chess or of administration. Appeals should be made to the Chief Arbiter, Harry Baines. If a player is dissatisfied by the Chief Arbiter's decision they may appeal to the Appeals Committee.

An appeal to the Appeals Committee must be lodged with the Congress Director in writing, accompanied by a £2 deposit, returnable if the appeal is successful. The intention to appeal must be declared within one hour of the Chief Arbiter's decision.

The Appeals Committee will be:

Stewart Reuben, Congress Director or Gerry Walsh, FIDE Arbiter, in the Chair. Two National Arbiters not involved in the original dispute.

Two players' representatives to be appointed (nominations welcome).

TIE-BREAKING AND PLAY-OFFS

In the event of a tie for any title other than the British Championship, the title will be SHARED. In the event of a tie for any prize monies, the money will also be shared.

The British Championship will be resolved by a play-off. Should the play-off be tied, it will be resolved by one-hour games. The prize money involved in this tie will be carried forward to the play-off and divided according to the final results.

In the event of a tie for the free places in the 1987 Kleinwort Grieveson British Championships in Swansea or the Hastings place in the Major Open the following will be used to break the ties: Sum of Progressive Scores. If this fails to break the tie then Sum of Opponents' Scores, except that the scores of the lowest-scoring and of the highest-scoring opponent will be disregarded.

In the event of there being a tie for the U.K. player who will have the right to play the Challenge Match against the U.S. Champion, if this takes place: this will be decided by the play-off, if it is for first place. If on a lower score, it will be decided by the system described in the paragraph above.

RATINGS & GRADES

Ratings and grades shown on the wall charts, other than those prefixed with an 'E' for estimate, are, as appropriate: FIDE list of 1 July 1986; BCF Union lists of Autumn 1985; Welsh list of Autumn 1985; Scottish list of July 1985; Jister list of Easter 1986; other national lists as advised.

CONVERSION OF GRADES

England uses a different scale to that used in the rest of the British Isles. The generally accepted conversion formula is to multiply the English grade by 8, then add 600, to reach the foreign rating. Thus 175 converts to 2000, and 1600 to 125.

THE BRITISH CHAMPIONSHIP

How to qualify for 1987

All players must be citizens of the U.K. or of a Commonwealth country; or have been domiciled in the U.K. for the past 5 years. If this applies, any of the following is a means of qualifying:

- (a) British Champion in any of the past 5 years;
- (b) A score of 71/2/11 or better in the previous year's Championship;
- (c) The reigning British Under-21 Champion;
- (d) Finishing in the top three, or highest placed under-21, of the previous year's Major Open;
- (e) An active rating of 220 (2360) or higher in a current British Isles national grading list, or the BCF interim list, or the FIDE list of 1 January 1987, or of 1 July 1987;
- (f) Women players graded 200 (2200) or higher. If this provides less than 3 contestants, the number can be made up down to grade 190 (2120).
- (g) The Champion, or nominee, of each of the English Chess Unions;
- (h) The 3 highest placed players, not already qualified, in the 1986 Leigh Grand Prix:
- (i) The highest placed player, not already qualified, in the 1986 Lloyds Bank Masters, 1986 Swansea British Isles Open or 1987 A.R.C. Young Masters;
- The two highest placed players, not already qualified, in the 1986/87 Foreign & Colonial Hastings Challengers;
- (k) The two highest placed competitors in regional weekend Swisses being organised by each English Chess Union;
- (1) Champions of Commonwealth countries of playing strength 200 (2200) or higher;
- (m) A nominee of the Scottish Chess Association, Welsh Chess Union or Ulster Chess Union;
- (n) A nominee of the BCF's Junior Selection Committee.

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



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


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
