It will be recalled that the Post Office calls for the complete covering of old post marks on window envelopes to areas where new postal sorting/stamping equipment is installed, particularly Southampton ara. The constant use of new envelopes is overcome by using $1 \frac{1}{2}$ inch sticky masking tape, the sticky strip of brown paper covering previous post marks and the new stamp sticks to it well. It will also be found that the masking tape strips off after 2 or 3 lares have been put on, allowing one to start afresh.

## GRADING

Our Fon．Secretary，Mr JoE．C．Grant，has been amusing himself with the Mathematics of the Grading System and I play so bold as to back him boing right and so publish it．
＂Under our present 3 figure system of Grading numbers， the difference between the top of one grade and the top of the next up，or down the scale is 8 ．
＂It is a fundamental principle of the Grading system that，theoretically，a player should achieve a $58 \%$ score $(50+8)$ against another exacily one grade below him．（B．C．F．Year Book 1963－64，page 49／51）．

This means that his chances are that he will win 58 out of 100 games，or that the odds are 58 to 42.
＂It would seem that the odds against beating a player 2，3， 4 etc．grades below must be：－

＂Expressed in terms of percentages，this means that a player should achieve（over a lengthy series of games）the following results：－

＂It would appear，therefore，that it is impossible to achieve 100 results however weak the opposition！ $11-10-67$ ．

The above shows more clearly than I can ever express that，in fact，Hampshire players in County sides have really done well to date this season．

With an average of 19 grading points between each player, or, if you like, over $2 \frac{1}{4}$ grades, anyone who calls it a bad beating on the figure facts is hardly fair - to those who won and draw generally I say 'Well done'.

Once again odds of almost two grades were against the county and thus the result cannot be viewed as cther than a good effort.

At their meeting in September, Dr C. G. Addingley was elected President for this season with Mr P.S. Milner-Barry his Vice-President. I feel all will join me in wishing the new President a successful term of Office.

Mr G.W. Henlen, I.S.O.. M.B.E., announced that he would resign as the Eiditor of the Year Book when it was published and that the General Secretiary, Mr G. H. Simmons, would take over from him.

The application of the English Primary Schools Chess Association for affiliation io the Federation was unanimously agreed.

A request for financial help by the organisers of the International Team Tournament for the Blind to be held in Weymouth during March-April, 1968, was considered and a donation of £50 granted. Private persons wishing to help financially may send donations to Mr H. H. Cohn, Treasurer, The International Braille Chess Asscciation, 128 Wain Lane, London N.W.2. Over £3,000 is needed to cover all expenses.

A revised agreement with the Scotish Chess Association was agreed and there are hopes that this will be a more permanent agreement.

It is reported with regret that the Chess Education Society has announced its intention not to remain in its present form as its objects are now covered in other directions. There will be a meeting between the B.C.F. and C.E.S. to sort out the implications and to arrange for the transfer of any assets of the Society.

Mr C.E. Williams was elected Chairman of the Executive Commititee. The personnel of the various other commitiees were also elected.

A Czecho-Slovakian Chess Association suggestion, that a World Girls' Chess Championship should be considered, was approved by the B.C.F.

## BRITISH CHAMPIONSHIP_QUALIFYING TOURNAMENT

There was a total of 225 entries for this tournament, for which 19 places are reserved in the 1968 Championships at Brisiol.

NEW HAVERING WOMEN'S INTTERNATIONAL
The Worla Lady Champion, Nona Gaprindashvili, won this tournament as well as the Paignton one with a score of 6 points. Second was Katrina Jovanovic with $4 \frac{1}{2}$ points. Mrs E. Pritchard was one of the two joint thirds with 4 points.

Equal first were L.A. Edwards (Leicester) and R.H. Watson (Muswell Hill). In the play-off for the trophy Watison has so far mon one game.

INVITATION TO B.C.F。
The French Chess Federation has invited the B.C.F. to a series of bi-annual matches. Their request for the first one this year in December was not possible, but it is hoped to arrange these in future years.

Following an appointment in Weymouth，it was found practical at short notice for this well known young player to give a simultaneous display at the Winfrith Chess Club on Sunday，12th November．He was prepared to play fifiy players，but with only six days to get players together， only 29 players attended．Mr Keene won 21 games，drew 6 and lost 2 －despite a severe cold．

## HAMPSHIRE INDIVIDUAL TOURITMENT

More usual is BxN , 9. $\mathrm{P}-\mathrm{Q} 5 \mathrm{~B}-\mathrm{B} 3,10 \mathrm{R}-\mathrm{K} 1$ $\mathrm{N}-\mathrm{K} 2,11 \mathrm{RxN}$ and now possibly Castles when Black gains the initiative if white forces the position.

This move clearly indicates that White is obiaining a strong position as Black has to block the a3-f8 diagonal and not accept the Rook

The only move to prevent loss of material which was threatened after $P-Q 5$ as this could now be countered by $P-Q N 4$. Inhibiting $P-Q N 4$ and threatening to win the KB , again forcing Black's reply.

Taking the $R$ would leave Black a piece down for a pawn, with no positional compensation, e.g. $14 \ldots$ PxR 15. QxP+ Q $-\mathrm{Q} 2,16 . \mathrm{R}-\mathrm{K} 1+\mathrm{K}-\mathrm{Q1}, 17 . \mathrm{QxR} \mathrm{R}-\mathrm{K} 1,18 . \mathrm{RxR}+$ QxR,19. B-NT. Also Black may well not have foreeen White's 16th move, and hoped to win the exchange.

Forced.
N-N5 appears equal to the task and in one line permits White to mate with 2 B \& N . However, it is not quite as forcing as the line played.

## GRADING

Since the issue of the first Bulletin with its Grading List, various questions have been asked about grading. At the risk of being boring to the knowledgeable, for which I apologise, I offer those wanting information a short outline on this big subject. It is my particular hope that it might stir clubs and schools to appointing their own Grading Officer and thus bring about an easing of the tremendous burden on County and Area Grading Officers.

History. In the early 1950's the British Chess Federation appointed a committee to enquire into both the form and desireability of attempiing a ranking, or grading list for British Chess players. This Committee reported that it would be quite an impossible task to rank other than a very few players at the top. They concluded "Grading would be more acceptable to the British Chess playing Public as all players think they are better than their equals and thus a Ranking List would be just tco painful". After much deliberation and not without quite a lot of opposition, the B.C.F. finally decided on a system of Grading in the Autumn of 1953. The first English Grading List was issued in the Spring of 1954 with 49 names in it.

The Grading System adopted tried to include good points in foreign systems whilst whilst lending itself to English oonditions. Grading DOES NOT SAY one player is betier than another, but it does try to assess and give a value to a player's recent past record of play -- or, if you like, his recent performance.

The system was reviewed in 1957/58 and again in 1965/66, so that today, as far as is possible, grading is achieved by considering the results obtained by a player from 30 or more games played under serious conditions during the last chess season. When a player has not played 30 serious games in a season, it is permissible to use 10 games from the previous season. If the Grader (person who worizs out the grades) does not have 30 game results at the end of each season for a given player, such player cannot be allotted a firm grading. Such players are usually covered in supplementary lists, if thought fit.

The System. It was designed to cover all players, good and bad. To achieve this figures large enough to show a difference were necessary. The figures had to allow for changes in the quality of a player's play and to fit in reasonably well with the different European and American systems. Any suitable set of figures could be used but it was finally decided to use divisions of 80 points and that each 80 points should be known as a specific grade.

The IMPORTANT factor of this is that one player exacily one whole grade higher than another player SHOULD win $50 \%$ ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) plus $10 \%$ ( 8 of 80 ) - $58 \%$ - of games if both players played true to their grade over a long series of games.

Working with the grade width of 80 points, it was decided to call Grade 1A 2482 to 2403 points. Grade 1B 2402 to 2323. Grade 2A 2322 to 2243. Grabe $2 B 2242$ to 2163 and so on down to $10 B 962$ to 833 , or for Junior Chess 13B is 482 to 403.

When a player has no grade, adults are usually started at 10 A on 1000 , but Junior Chess starts about 500 , or 13 A .

The method of working out the grade is as follows.
First lets assume one's grade as, say, 1505. This is in 7A Grade width. For each game one wins, add 500 points to your opponent's grade and for each one losi, substract 500 points from the opponents grade. For a draw simply score the opponent's grade number. Total up the number of points thus obtained and divide the total by the number of games played. That is your grade figure.

There are two complications to this system. The first is that where there is a difference of more than 500 points between the two players grade figures, then each score their own grade points if the higher grade player wins. If its a draw, or the high grade player loses, then grade normally.

The second complication is that, for county and local grading, all grade figures are divided by 10 , including 50 added or substracted in the place of 500 for the official system. This means grades are 8 , not 80 points wide.

In turn this makes Grade 1 A 248 to 241 , 1 B 240-233 etc., down to 10 B being $96-88$ or 13A 56-43. Just somewhat easier figures where accuracy is subordinate to a guide.

In International and Grand Master play, the figures go up above the British figures by about 3 grades, ie., about 2700 authentic grading or 270 in the county system. The following is an example of working out your grading after playing 10 games (only ten to save space). Mr A, grade 150, plays: -

1. Mr B, grade 165 and wins
2. Mr C, grade 160 and Ioses
3. Mr D, grade 155 and draws
4. Mr E, grade 125 and wins
5. Mr F, grade 120 and draws
6. Mr G, Grade 120 and loses
7. Mr H, Grade 220 and loses (own grade)
8. Mr J, grade 220 and draws
9. Mr K, grade 220 and wins

10 Mr L , grade 90 and loses

Equal 2nd were Geller, Russia; Korchnoy, Russia and Gligoric, Yugo-Slavia with 14 points. The Hungarian Grand Master Portish was 5 th with $13 \frac{1}{2}$ points. Equal 6th were Reshevsky, $U_{0} S_{0} A_{0}$; Hori, Czecho-Slovakia and Siein, Russia 13 points.

The last three will play off early next year for the 6th place in the Challengers Tournament Jater next year.
RUSSIA WINS COMPUTER CHESS
The 'Daily Telegraph' reports that the Russians, using the computers of the Institute of Experimental Physics with White pieces on boards 1 and 3, have won the four boards match against the Americans, using the computers of Stamford University by 3 points to 1. Russia won the 3 and 4 th games, whilst games one and two were agreed drawn.
