Subsequently numerous complaints reached me of bad typing with impossible scores. I have spent the past fortnight trying to sort out the mess and I must admit to making 4 typing errors in the 26 games. The rest were wrong due to various scoring reasons -the worst being attributable to our youthful Champion whose A's, B's, D's 3's, 5's, 8's and E's are all plain bad at times. The Team building and Leadership of our Match Captain is clearly reflected in these figures and, with luck not to lose too many of our rising young players, another two years should see Hampshire immerge as a really strong side for the steady trend is unmistakeable.

One reads in the Southern Evening Echo of Dec 19th last the query "Hampshire Chess Team lose again: What is wrong". Further "Once again they are soundly defeated".

Whilst, no doubt, this makes good sensational reporting, the truth is that the Surrey match was our first real defeat of the year. Hampshire, thrown into the struggle of big time Chess when joining the Southern Counties Chess Union, have been slowly building and consolidating their position and above are the figures to prove it. The average grading of the last match dropped due to the absence of the two Southampton University players, P.H. Collins and A.J. Sanz, plus the absence of that hard fighter, A.F. Stimson.

The answers for the absence of strong players can broadly be lumped under economic demands, whether it be business requirements, University work, the demands of wife and family or just plain travelling costs.

HAMPSHIRE v. SURREY.

This match was played at Guildford's Royal Grammar School on December 7th and the County received its worst beating this season. Surrey won the Championship Match by 12 to 8 and the Amboyna by $29\frac{1}{2}$ to $20\frac{1}{2}$.

A particular feature of this match was the failure of the more experienced players whilst the younger contingent did comparatively well. It could be that the long car journey tells more on the older players in a general sense.

Gosport and Portsmouth, with 4 wins each, stand out well clear of all other Clubs in Division 1 and the Local Derby, when these two teams meet, should prove the deciding match for the League Championship.

In Division 2, Gosport and Kinson each have one win, whilst Fareham has two losses. Thus the meeting of Gosport and Kinson should decide the fate of the newly formed 2nd Division.

It will be observed from records that Messrs S. Saverymuttu, D.K. Browning and W.J.E. Yeeles have each played twice in the first 3 places of the Gosport Team, thus leaving an unquestion-able choice for the position of top board for the 2nd Division Match, whilst Kinson have the more confirmed order of G.H. Bennett, M.J. Pryce and D.P. Lock. Whilst this is not intended as any criticism at the moment; there can be none; it might be as well for the future, if the 2nd Division becomes permanent, to have the 1st three players in Division One nominated - a matter which might well be considered at the Late results: next A.G.M.

S.C.C.U. FIXTURES MEETING

This meeting was held at St Bride's Institute, London, on Saturday, January 25th, business commencing shortly after 2.30 PM. In attendance for Hampshire was your Match Captain, Mr H.L. Parsons, and the Bulletin Editor.

A long discussion took place on the London Match Venue. It was reported that several counties disapproved of the Royal Festival Hall and that the Management of the Hall wished to increase the charges well beyond what was considered to be our means. It was stated that there might be some hope of the Management reducing its demands whilst there was some consideration of alternative venues at the Central Hall, Westminster, and Bishop's Gate Institute.

Various views were expressed as to the desireability of tea breaks at county matches at the London Match Venue. Th finally left to depend upon the facilities available at the This was Venue finally chosen, whilst those responsible for the final choice had knowledge of the various wishes expressed. Under the heading of the above discussion strong views

were voiced of the desireability of a London Chess Centre where visitors from all over the world could obtain the chess amenities they desired. It was realised that the financial difficulties were great at the present - however it was hoped that, when the present laws of the country on Sport and/or Fine Arts could be amended so that one or the other would cover Chess, there might

be real opportunity for progress. The Treasurer's report showed that the Union was solvent but with little to spare.

The Tournament Secretary reported that he had received some very late requests for adjudications - some as much as five weeks after the game was played. It was generally agreed that the Rules should be applied in such cases whilst, under the present postal conditions and the demands of a hurried closure of matches at the Royal Festival Hall, it was agreed that the present 4 days rule wanted looking at by the Rules Committee with a view to making this time a more realistic period.

He continued with a report on the unfortunate mistake of booking the Royal Festival Hall for the Hampshire v. Middlesex Amboyna match on 15th February. (This match is being played at Eastleigh). I am most pleased to report that the Hampshire Match Captain was able to prove to the complete satisfaction of all present that it was not the fault of any Hampshire Official and thus the County were not officially financially responsible. He did state he would ask the Hampshire Authorities to view this matter sympathetically later in the season when the county's financial position was clearer. A similar case concerning another county was considered, but here it was thought the county officials were responsible and should meet any loss. Suggestions were then put forward to prevent such positions

in the future and all agreed that these were most desireable.

The Junior Organiser reported that the S.C.C.U. Junior Championships would be held at Southend at Easter as last year.

No special coverage would be provided for ages under 17. . He reported the composition of a London Junior Team invited to play against a similar team in Hamburg. On being asked why higher graded Juniors were not invited than those named, he pointed out it was a London Team invited, not a S.C.C.U. team. He concluded by stating it was his intention to resign

his post after the Junior Jamboree on February 22nd next. Consideration was given as to the method of collecting the

B.C.F. Board fees. It was decided that the Union should be responsible for the collection and payment of these fees at the proper time. Should any county default, the Union should pay that county's fees to avoid another county in the Union being penalised and the Union should support the B.C.F. penalty clauses finally recommended. It was also agreed that the Union should take suitable action against any defaulting county. A side-line of this discussion showed that individual County Championships came under the jurisdiction of B.C.F. Board Fees because the winners of such were entitled to graduate to the Union Championship and hence to the B.C.F. one.

The meeting then turned to consideration of the actual fixtures for next season. Here I must acclaim the expertise of our Match Captain in getting-in first with his clear voice to stake claims for alterations desireable to Hampshire. This settled as best practical, other counties had their say and it was clear to the writer that, had we not got-in first, we might well have lost several desireable alterations, and faced heavy commitments in October and November. This itinerary appears to leave clear the first two weekends in October and/or the First two weekends in February 1970 which the Hampshire Authorities, if they so wish, might use to hold their County Championship similar to the last two years.

Finally I find it personally amazing that some counties failed to have a representative present to support any wishes they might have at such an important meeting affecting the welfare of Chess and its players throughout the whole of South and Southeastern England.

It occurs to me that it may not be widely appreciated that if the Royal Festival is not available, the fixtures have had to be arranged so that not more than 100 boards would be required on any one afternoon as a replacement hall might be too small to take 150 boards. This made this particular meeting more important than ever.

SPEDAN-LEWIS UNDER 15 JUNIOR JAMBOREE

From this year onwards this Jamboree is open to all schools in the County and the only qualifications are that children entered shall be under 15 years of age on 1st September 1968 and that they shall be registered junior players with the County Association.

The Jamboree is arranged for two rounds to be played on one day to keep expenses as low as possible and it is probable that the first round will be played at 10 AM and the second round at 2.30 PM on March 29th at Beechwood School, Bitterne, Southampton.

All teams entering the Jamboree are asked to bring with them three boards, three sets of men and three clocks and to arrive at the venue as soon after 9.30 AM as possible

and to arrive at the venue as soon after 9.30 AM as possible. In sending me these details, the Junior Organiser expressed a fear that there would be few schools entering the Jamboree as not many had registered pupils.

As Publicity Officer and in the interests of good publicity I investigated this position from the official county registration records. To my horror I found that, at the moment, only 6 schools out of well over 50 possibles had registered players to permit them to enter this Jamboree.

In a telephone discussion with the County Hon. Secretary, it was felt possible that the registration cost was proving too high and that it might be better to offer an alternative entrance fee of 2/6d which might stimulate wider interest and incidently give the County Association double the income.

rance fee of 2/6d which might stimulate wider interest and incidently give the County Association double the income. I circularised all mainly concerned in this with the suggestion of entrance being free to registered Juniors and by payment of 2/6d to unregistered Juniors - thereby hoping to encourage a wider entrance.

Whilst I received no opposition from those interested in the adult side, I did receive strong opposition from those controlling the schools side. This, of course, ruled out any possibility of a change and the Registration requirement stands. It is to be hoped that other schools realise they must register teams before March 15th, or there will be danger of the Registrations becoming effective in time for the tournament.

One pleasing factor emerges from this. School organising authorities must strongly approve the Registration entrance qualification, or they would not oppose a suggestion of its being altered. Time will now have to build up the entrants as best possible. I am sure all will hope that this Jamboree fulfills its object in giving Juniors tournament training, and in view of the strong support for registration, I am sorry I attempted to get it watered up or down, depending on which angle it is seen from.
