


Dr Max Euwe, the Dutch ex-World Champion and International Grand Master, has been elected the next President of F.I.D.E. (The Federation Internationale des Echecs - Official name - or The International Chess Federation).

Celebrating his appointment, he will Captain a match of 10 boards The World v. The U.S.S.R. in Belgrade starting

in the vicinity of Easter this year.

Among World leading players Dr Euwe has invited to represent

the World side are: -

Bent Larsen, Denmark. Bobby Fischer, U.S.A. Layosz Portish, Hungary. Ivkov, Yugo-Slavia. Sviatazor Gligoric, Yugo-Slavia. Wolfgang Uhlmann, East Germany. Matulovic, Yugo-Slavia (Play starts March 29th) Darga, West Germany. M. Najdorf, Argentine. S. Reshevsky, U.S.A.

Olafsson, Iceland. (Acknowledgements Daily Telegraph) One wonders how many of these strong players will finally accept the invitations. If Bobby Fischer accepts, this might affect his coming match against Ex-World Champion Mikhail Botvinnik - which the latter states is still on despite the Dutch Federation withdrawing its organisation support. This is believed to be due to Fischer wanting the winner to be the first to win 6 games, instead of the highest scorer in a set number of games which could result in the match lasting an indefinite time. If correct, one cannot blame the Dutch Federation being unwilling to risk financial loss through a long drawn-out series of draws.

CHESS MARRIAGES - VARIOUS

The World Lady Champion, Nona Gaprindashvili, was married on Nov 26th last to Dr Anzor Chichinadze at Tiflis and readers should note the new name of the World Lady Champion, or they may wonder who she is when they next read her new name.

Bill Hartston, Cambridge University, married Miss Jana Malypetrova, the Czecho-Slovakian Lady Champion on January 1st. English Chess thus recruits a strong Lady player to support the joint English Champions, Mrs R.M. Bruce and Miss D. Dobson.

S.C.C.U. EXECUTIVE

Your Union Executive met at St Bride's Institute at 6.45 PM on Jan 9th and arrangements were finalised for the Council Fixtures Meeting on February 7th. Many angles were expressed and it was decided to put certain matters on the Council Agenda.

Both Financial and Registration matters were extensively

reviewed, which took up considerable time.

Mr P.E. Morrish circulated the proposed Fixtures List for next Season and from the very few calling for alterations, it must be considered he had made an excellent job of this difficult work.

Consideration of the proposed new rules were slightly discussed and it was apparent that time would be far too short to complete anything on the spot. Realising that, at each meeting a similar position arose, it was decided to hold a Special Executive Meeting on March 13th to deal exclusively with this matter.

Besides queries as to the best rules for settlement of Registration fees, etc., there is the question of re-writing the boundaries of Middlesex for future reference without taking away, or adding parts to various counties. There is also the question of venues for the various competitions, Championship, Amboyna and Ebony. What are to be called Home and Away fixtures and what are equi-distant fixtures and who shall pay what. These matters, to reach an agreed settlement, will call for a lot of good will plus plenty of 'give' and 'take'. However, my short experience does lead me to believe all are well-meaning and will do their best.

It was agreed to looking into the possibility of establishing some sort of equalisation fund for Executive Members travelling expenses over a certain figure. This was something distinct from Council meetings which were considered to be the counties

Our Match-Captain writes, "A Hampshire win as both adjudications are decidedly in our favour, with a probable win on 11 and a

possible win on 17."

"Hampshire's first win ever against Kent, and as they have won all their matches this season, the next match against Oxford, also unbeaten, will be vital. At the moment Hampshire have a great chance of achieving a treble, reaching the quarter-finals of the Counties Championship, winning the Montague-Jones Cup in spite of a higher handicap, and winning the Amboyna Shield as they have won all their 50 board matches".

Despite this from our Match Captain and knowing of the fixtures, I find that two players important to the strength of the side have decided to miss the Oxford match in favour of a weekend congress. Am I really getting so old-fashioned and out-of-date when I look for some 'esprit de corps' in a real hour of need?.

Mr J.H. Jones, being modest, states his game with the Black pieces beating Max Fuller was not good but I feel confident that most Hampshire players will appreciate this game, so here it is: 1. (The alternatives depend very much on style - 6. 0-0 leading to a positional struggle, or 6. NxP with sharp tactical complications.) 6. ... Q-B3; (My own move 6. ... P-Q3 being 'book'). 7. 0-0 KN-K2; 8. P-Q4 PxP; 9. P-K5 (Played after much thought, however 9 BN5 QN3; 10 BxN: BxB:; 11 PxP O-O; 12 NB3 PQ3 deserved consideration. Against Stritten in Portsmouth League 1968/69 the game continued 13 NQ5 BQ1; 14. RB BN2; 15 BB2? RB; 16 BN1 NK2:; 17 NB4 QR3; 18 QQ2? PKB4:; and Black went on to win.) 9. ... NxP; 10. NxN QxN; 11 PxP? (Again played after a long delay. The point of 9 PK5 was supposed to be either 11 BxP+ or 11 QB3. In event of 11 BxP+ KxB; 12 QB3+ QB3; 13 BxQP PB3:; or 13 RK ?? Looking ahead at the above List, I do think we should do well to seriously consider our means of travel for the Oct 17th match against Essex, probably at Chelmsford. Could those from the various areas come to the A.G.M. in May with definite views, or if nobody attending from places like Farnborough, they might submit views in writing via our Hon. Secretary after a club discussion. Could Portsmouth and Bournemouth areas get quotes for, say 30 seater busses from their areas, Portsmouth . side to consider going up via Fareham and Farnborough, whilst the Bournemouth one calling at Southampton, Winchester and Basingstoke. Finally Southampton get a large bus quote so that it could be decided at the A.G.M. which is best. Advice seem given me is that train to Waterloo, across London and on down to Chelmsford cannot be recommended, due to possible delays of football crowds and similar factors at the time the team would be crossing London. At any rate a few enquiries and prices can do no harm so long as no firm booking is made until agreement is reached. The H.C.A. might even consider a special grant to a bus/buses for this special occasion to keep fares reasonable. The A.G.M. could consider such a matter if members come prepared.

Looking closer at the above proposed fixtures list, It would appear to give the consecutive weekends starting Fridays, Oct 23rd and 30th as suitable dates for the Hampshire Senior Individual Championship next season.


In actual practice, it is one of the hardest facets of Chess to think several moves ahead, and it is even more difficult to realise when one is in a position to make a sound combination. That is why competitions where one has to analyze out positions by using combinative play are very false and artificial, because they completely neglect this latter important factor. When one is told to look for something, one can invariably find it, but to know you are in this situation without being told is the situation over the board.

Even with a large number of games to refer to, the majority of positions produced are not very deep, nor hard to solve. Here is a position that is composed from an idea got from an actual game.

White to play and win against any defence: -

Black.
