THE SHAPE OF THINGS TO COME (???)

For many years now one has heard the non-Metropolitan Counties complain that it was difficult to get a good team to travel to London. In more recent times one has heard the Metropolitan counties complain that it was difficult to get a representative side to travel outside the Metropolis - a cry that has been widely heard since the introduction of the Home and Away system of matches instead of travelling to London to play.

The result was that, some time ago, the Southern Counties Chess Union set up a small sub-committee to investigate and report back with suggestions for the County Championship, Amboyna and Ebony Shiled competitions. They reported back to the last S.C.C.U. Executive meeting and the Executive approved it by a large majority for submission to the next Southern Counties Chess Union Council in June in the hope that the Council would adopt the recommendations so that they should be operative next season. I would add I was one of a small minority to vote against the proposals.

The proposals broadly and still not complete in detail, are that the 14 counties comprising the S.C.C.U. should be split into 4 groups, 2 of 4 counties and 2 of three counties. Each group should play the counties within its group once before the end of the Year for County Championship purposes. The two leading counties in the 4 groups and the winners of the 2 three group counties should then pass on to a new group of 6 counties for play-off in the New Year - the four group counties game between the two 4 group counties promoted to the New Year group to count as one match result in the new group. This means that each winning team of the 3 counties group would have to play 5 matches in the New Year and the 4 group Counties 4 matches and the winner of this latter group to be the S.C.C.U. Champion County to go forward to the B.C.F. section of the County Championship later in March/April.

At the same time, the Amboyna and Ebony Shields should be set up as seperate teams of probably 25 boards each with seperate Captain and organisation, although it was agreed that where two particular counties wished, they could agree to play the Championship and Amboyna matches at the same time. Without mutual agreement they would have to be played seperately.

The county groupings for the first part of the season would last for 2 years so as to provide a home and away fixture. However the New Year section will or could be made up of changing counties yearly. It thus recommended that a small sub-committee shall yearly decide the home and away fixtures for the New Year each year when the Counties are known. This will save any questioning whose home and away fixtures they are and it will be the duty of the sub-committee to distribute the fixtures as fairly as possible.

I opposed this system on a number of counts. Firstly it means booking a number of venues in the New Year for January, February and March, probably for 20 to 25 boards and thus our good venues at Eastleigh and Southampton would become obsolete. It might be difficult, although such rooms at schools on Saturday afternoons I understand are plentiful in the Bournemouth Area at any rate.

Secondly instead of the Amboyna 50 boards being the 1st 50 board side, the Amboyna will now virtually become a 2nd Team affair with the first 15 boards Championship players debarred from taking part. The Honour of playing for a 50 board First Team will be lost and the 2nd Team 25 will hold no such glamour. Lets be honest, most of us have a little vain streak in us. Even worse for Enbony 3rd Team efforts. However it does mean the Ebony can be played on Home & Away basis thus attracting a wider field.

All Counties interested in what is decided on should have their FULL Delegations in attendance at the June S.C.C.U. Council meeting - brought forward a month to give Counties time to reorganise if it is adopted.

I omit another angle, cost, because one could always opt out of the Amboyna if thought fit for cost reasons, or for that matter the Championship and just play Amboyna and/or Ebony. Possible travelling distance to Oxford, Cambridge and Essex in one year looks frightening - but may never happen.

YOUR BULLETIN (?)

You have now entrusted me with the task of producing the Bulletin for the last three years and firstly I must say I have enjoyed it, although at the same time I do think it is now time to give somebody else a chance if they would like to take it over. Beyond this, there are other grave considerations that must

Beyond this, there are other grave considerations that must be faced soon. This Bulletin is now costing the Hampshire Association something like 3d to 4d a copy over the 5/- charged and it has been argued that, at the price, it is good publicity.

However with paper and materials generally rising in cost and the almost certainty of 2d to 3d on each posting increase in the near future, the cost per copy looks like jumping to 6d to 8d over income. It must thus be decided just how much one can add to costs before the Association is forced to increase prices.

To use cheaper paper would mean using one side only, cut down on material and it ceases to be informative and in danger of becoming a results only effort - is that wanted, people do like to see their names in print but that can wear thin. We shall soon have to choose.

THE GREATEST MATCH

Starting on March 29th is probably the greatest Chess Match for years when the F.I.D.E. President's Team, composed of the Rest of the World, take on the U.S.S.R. Team over 10 boards, each pair of opponents playing 4 games against the same opposition. The Teams line up as follows: -

Miss Gaprindashvili, the World Lady Champion, now married, continues her winning ways and leads with 10 points in the Belgrade Women's International Tournament after 12 rounds. Miss Kushnir, U.S.S.R., is in 2nd place with 7½ points. Both have unfinished games to add to their scores.

The Soviet Weekly Chess Column reports that the reserves for this match will be, for the U.S.S.R., Leonid Stein and David Bronstein and the Rest of the World Olafsson of Iceland and Klaus Darga of West Germany.

This Column also gives current world leadership as: -1, Boris Spassky; 2 Victor Korchnoi; 3 Tigram Petroshan; 4 Bent Larsen, Denmark; 5 Lev Polugayevsky; 6 Vlastimil Hort, Czecho-Slovakia; 7 Lajos Portisch, Hungary; 8 Vasily Smyslov; 9 Efim Geller and 10 Svetozar Gligoric, Yugo-Slavia. Council meeting on June 27th at 2 PM will have quite a lot to consider and Union representation should be at full strength. The N.C.C.U. challenge to the voting strength of the S.C.C.U., incorporating the London League votes - as they thinkmight also come up if last year's rulings are complied with. Tournament Secretary has ruled that this player is not elligible for Essex, this could cause Essex the loss of 2 points and thus make the match a close result.

By winning this match Hampshire went through the S.C.C.U. (S) section without losing a match and won the S.C.C.U. South Championship, qualifying for the B.C.F. County Championship Quarter Finals and will play Lancashire. They are the current holders, have done for several years and are almost certainly the stiffest opposition it is possible to meet. The tie will be played in Birmingham on April 25th and is so timed as to fit in with through trains from Southampton there and back.

HAMPSHIRE HONOURS LIST THIS SEASON TO DATE

With the B.C.F. and S.C.C.U. Championship matches yet to be played, it is perhaps a little early to submit a full - so called - honours list, but on the other hand it is end of season for all bar the top 20 boards with few adjudication results outstanding.

One player has won on each of three appearances in the County side but as that player has also defaulted three times, twice without notifying the Match Captain, his name is not included. I take as a minimum 5 games played - over half - and then

work out the percentage of points scored against appearances. If anybody has a better idea and likes to send it, I will publish it in the next Bulletin - the last for this season.

Considerable doubt about awarding a prize under 150 was encountered as no sure grading was available for Mr A.J. Dean. Mr H.L. Parsons later found **his** last recorded grading was 150, just above the limit. Mr R.C. Hayman thus qualified for the Under 150 Grade Prize. It should noted also that in Bulletin No 6 Mr Dean's Grading is given as 174. This same figure also occurs in the S.C.C.U. Grading List 1968, hence the award to Mr R.C. Hayman appears correct.

HAMPSHIRE TEAM LIGHTNING CHAMPIONSHIP 1970.

This was played at the Beechwood Junior School, Southampton, on Feb 21st. Twenty teams took part in this Swiss type Tournament with Team Results deciding placings and games won being used to split ties. It was ruled that there should be as many rounds as possible but no round would start after 6 PM. Following Round 6, some 5 top teams had games for adjudication, some critical and caused a delay of some 15 minutes so that Round 7 finished at 6.05 PM and an 8th Round was lost.

The strong Issonians 1 Team became Champions with $6\frac{1}{2}$ Pts and $20\frac{1}{2}$ games, closely followed by Portcastrians with $6\frac{1}{2}$ Pts and 19 games. Southern Grammar, with two good wins, came from behind to win 3rd place - a truly excellent performance by 4 3chcolboys, ably led by Our President, Commander A.J. Peters.

Pairings were achieved as far as possible to avoid "Local Derby's", thereby giving players a wider variety of opponents whilst the top 4 Teams all had 4 Blacks and 3 Whites on Board 1.

Mr A.M. Ldmonds, the Champion's Captain, thanked Mr P.M. Collins and his helpers for his efficient organisation and a pleasant afternoon's play. The reliability of his young 6th Form Lady helpers was really excellent.
