CHESS NOTES

20th September, 1976

The 26 names set out below show the Gradings of those registered local players whose names begin N-S. This controversial issue has now, I hope, been finally resolved, as the Executive Committee of the W.E.C.U. decided (in response to an appeal from the Hampshire Executive) to modify their previous ruling (that is, to publish the names but not the grading numbers of unregistered players in future Grading Lists) and to allow the gradings of unregistered Junior players to appear but for the first time only. The idea is to let Junior Organisers at least know of up-and-coming Juniors' existence; if the Junior concerned wishes to see both his name and grading number in the next list, he must be registered through his County.

One other doubt has been removed; the W.E.C.U. are to stick to their previous ruling that all games in all tournaments which allow 'sudden-death' endings will be excluded from the grading routine.
