I have already had a good response to my appeal for material from local players; please keep it up. The following End Game starts from the diagrammed position and arose from the game M.A. Vidler v. M.J. Cawston in the 1978 Evening Standard Congress.

1. R-N4 R-K5; 2. R-N5 P-Q5; 3. R-N4 K-B3; 4. RxRP? K-K4 (White's R is now badly placed and Black's K has been given the time it needs to move towards the centre) 5. K-N2 R-B5 (cutting off the White K) 6. K-N3 R-B3 (6...K-K5?; 7. RxP+ wins for White); 7. R-R8 P-Q6; 8. R-Q8 K-K5 9. R-K8+ K-Q5; 10. R-Q8+ K-B6; 11. R-B8+ K-N7; 12. R-Q8 (at this stage, White made to move 13. K-B8??; luckily for him, he discovered his error before he removed his hand from the piece and was able to recover his winning line) 12...K-B7; 13. R-B8+ K-Q8; 14. R-Q8 P-Q7; 15. R-K8 R-B3:; 16.K-B2 K-B8; 17. R-Q8 P-Q8 = Q; 18. RxQ KxR and although the actual game went on for a further 32 moves, White was eventually mated.
